ORANGEVILLE.

THRESHER EXPLODES.

Serious Loss Incurred by Fire Which
Follows Singular Conflagration.

Orangeville, Emery Co., Sept. 28.—Fire
was the cause of some excitement and
several hundred dollars' loss, in this
usually quiet town, yesterday.
Half a dozen enterprising men here
recently brought from Price, the nearest
railroad station, a new threshing
machine. They had threshed two little
jobs, and had the machine set in Mrs.
Celia Toney's yard and began thresh-
ing, but had only turned out two bush-
els when a slight accident caused a
stop for a minute or two. The grain

was very scanty, but the machine was
not heated. However, on starting up
again, inside another kernel had been
loosed out, the burst out from the
cylinder, as if by an explosion, blowing
the fire in every direction. The "reder" and
"land" cylinder went over backward,
the loose straw on the cylinder was in a
heap, in an instant, and the scene that
followed was a sight to behold. First the
men rushed out from under the blaze
repeatedly, screamed and bawling, and
began to muddle and remove the
burned one pair of which were prodi-
giously hooked on to the separator and it
was rolled away from the machine, not
without burning one of the horses badly.

The loss is estimated at about \$500
to the machine company, while Mrs.
Thorne and her son lost about \$100 in
grain, hay, straw, etc. There was no in-
surance, and the situation in what
remained the best Mrs. Thorne and her
family have the sympathy of the com-
munity, and a subscription is being
taken up to help her in her loss.
