Sulphate of Iron ..... 1 dram  
Sulphuric acid ..... 1 dram  
Rectified spirits ..... 1 ounce  
Tincture of Labrad ..... 1 ounce  
Extract of rosemary ..... 4 drams  
Extract of thyme ..... 4 drams  
Glycerine ..... 1 ounce  
Elder-flower water ..... ½ pint

Add the iron to the spirits, the glycerine to the extracts and the tincture. Assist until well mixed and then pour all together. Mix the sulphuric acid and elder flower water and add this lastly to the other ingredients.

Apply to the scalp by means of a soft tooth brush or sponge nightly, following with massage. When color is restored use only twice a week.

It is always a good plan for women to frequently give the hair a sun and air bath.

Let the hair flow unconfined around the shoulders and sit in the sun and air when the weather will permit.

Persian Cakes—Make a jumble paste by beating together one cup of butter, one of sugar, four eggs, two cups of flour and one-half teaspoonful of baking powder, roll into any desired shape, then cut some thick narrow strips of the paste and lay around the cake to make a cup-like edge; spread on a buttered tin and bake. Dip slices of canned fruit which has been well drained, in the white of an egg slightly beaten, roll in powdered sugar and fill the centers of the cakes. The tops may be covered with a meringue if desired.
