Italy Warned Her Against Visiting There, Because of Anarchists.

LORD ROBERTS CRITICISED.

He Said a Good Word for an Opposing General, Cronje Interesting London Gossip.

[Early Dispatches.]

London, March 10 .- Special cable letter, copyrighted, 1900, by the Associated Press.-Queen Victoria's decision to stay in her own dominions instead of going to Italy, and all the jubilations in England in consequence, are not entirely due to the causes attributed by the press. It is learned that the Italian government had daily been growing more nervous as the date of the queen's visit approached, and finally notified her majesty's government that it would not care to accept the responsibility of the sovereign's safety, owing to the strong recrudescence of the anarchistic

Other debutantes are Lady Victoria Sybil Grey, daughter of Earl Grey and niece of the earl of Minto, governor general of Canada, the marquis of Cholmondeley's daughter, Lady Lettice Joan, and Lady Margaret Sackville, daughter of Countess De La Warr; while among the brides are the Hon. Mrs. Charles Coventry, who recently changed her American name, Whitehouse, to that arcient English patronymic, and the beautiful and rich countess of Cromarde, who recently
