AFTERNOON DISPATCHES. CONGRESSIONAL.

SENATE. Discussion of the Admission of Virginia Financial Bill.

Howard opposed the admission of Virginia. He said he could not overlook the fact that the Legislature was overwhelmingly rebel. Edmunds wanted the bill postponed till he could investigate the condition of affairs in Virginia. He took the ground that the spirit of the entire reconstruction acts give all rebels the right to take part in the reorganization of the States, except such as embraced the third clause in the 14th Amendment.

Sumner gave notice that he would introduce a bill to authorize the funding and consolidation of the national debt, extending banking facilities, &c.

Howe introduced a bill to more effectually preserve the neutrality relations of the United States.

Sherman, from the Committee on Finance, reported a bill as a substitute for all propositions relating to the national currency. The bill authorizes the issue of forty-five millions in circulating notes of the National Bank in addition to the three hundred millions now authorized.

More Patch-work for Virginia. After some preliminary proceedings in relation to the vote yesterday, on the Virginia bill, Bingham withdrew his bill, intending to offer it as a substitute for that of the Committee on Reconstruction.

Farnsworth, from the Committee on Reconstruction, reported a preamble, recognizing that the people of Virginia have adopted a constitution, republican in form, and insuring equal rights to all citizens of the United States under the laws; also a bill providing for the admission of the State, imposing certain conditions, among which is one for taking the oath by all persons elected to office, and that only those must be elected to office who never engaged in the rebellion, or that have been relieved from their disabilities; it also provides that the Constitution shall never be amended so as to deprive citizens or classes of any civil rights.

NEW YORK. Wholesale Refusers—More about the Knickerbocker. New York.—Thirty wholesale liquor establishments and distilleries were seized to-day, in the Third Long Island District, for alleged defrauding the Government of the tax on whiskey and for false returns.

MICHIGAN. Five Children Burned to Death. DETROIT.—A small house, in which a woman and eight children were sleeping, was burned last night; five of the children perished in the flames.

ILLINOIS. Loss of Life by explosion of Gasoline. CHICAGO, 11.—While Mrs. Hanterman was living on Roby St., this morning, while filling a lamp reservoir with gasoline fluid, the can containing the fluid exploded with frightful violence, covering Mrs. Hanterman, her husband and two children. Mrs. Hanterman and two children were probably fatally burned.

WASHINGTON. Confirmed by the Senate—Third Largest River in the World. WASHINGTON, 11.—The Senate has confirmed the nomination of Sawyer to the mint in Cincinnati.

The report of Captain Raymond, of the Engineer corps, describes the Yukon River, in Alaska, as the third largest in the world.

TENNESSEE.

Governor won't be inaugurated. MEMPHIS, 11.—The Avalanche's Jackson, special says, Governor Alcorn refuses to be inaugurated until the State is admitted into the Union. The legislature will meet and ratify the 15th Amendment, and elect United States Senators and will then adjourn until after the admission of the State.

FOREIGN NEWS.

GREAT BRITAIN.

John Bright in Birmingham—Another Royal pauper born—Heavy Gales.

BIRMINGHAM, 10.—The members of Parliament addressed their constituents in the Town Hall to-night. [When Jno. Bright appeared on the platform he met an enthusiastic reception. He made quite an elaborate speech on the disestablishment of the Irish Church, and the Irish land question. Resolutions were passed, thanking the ministry for their general policy, and for their course with regard to the Irish Church. Bright thanked his fellow citizens for the resolutions, conveying, as they did, an avowal of confidence in the government. He believed at the end of next session of Parliament a similar vote would be earned.

LONDON, 11.—The Princess Teck, formerly the Princess Mary of Cambridge, gave birth to a son last night. Heavy gales throughout Ireland, since Friday, have damaged shipping; many lives have been lost and much property destroyed.

FRANCE.

New Minister of War.—Rochefort's Paper Seized. Particulars of the Tragedy in Paris—Excitement over the affair.

PARIS.—It is reported that General Frocha is to replace Le Beuf as minister of War. The Office of the Marseillais, Henry Rochefort's newspaper, has been seized by order of the government. At a meeting of the Corps Legislatif to-day, M. Gouin Monpaigrou proposed that the members of the Imperial family be rendered amenable to the law. He said he had no intention of creating trouble, but wished simply to do away with unlawful exceptions. Rochefort referred, in bitter terms, to the murder of Victor Noir, and said our people shall judge his murderer, who though cousin to the Emperor, must not be allowed to escape. M. Olivier in reply promised that he should have justice in the course of his speech he used these words, "Where is justice, law and moderation? If you force us we will be the power." A communication from the Procureur Imperial was laid before the chamber, demanding the arraignment of the Deputy Henry Rochefort, for an outrage against the Emperor, for exciting disorder and violence. The demand was referred to the proper committee.

It is reported that Olivier, with the approval of the Emperor, has issued an order for the free return to France of Adga Babin and other noted exiles. The city is greatly excited over the tragedy which occurred yesterday afternoon by Prince Bonaparte, and his version of the affair is furnished the journals, to-day, by Paul Cassagnac who says the prince made the following statement to him, upon his honor. "M. Fourville and M. Victor came to my residence with a menacing air, with their hands in their pockets, and presented a letter from M. Paschall Graussett. I said it is Rochefort, not his creature that I seek. I read the letter, and said to Noir, my hand on my pistol in my pocket, 'are you responsible for it?' At this, I received a slap in my face from Noir, when I drew my pistol and fired at him. Fourville crouched behind a chair, and from the protection that afforded, he aimed his revolver at me, but could not get it off. I fired at him, while he was in that position, when he ran out of the room. He stepped into the room again and turned his pistol towards me. I fired at him again and he fled."

The Journal Official, this morning, contains a decree, convoking the Chambers for the purpose of bringing an action before the High Court of Justice, to decide upon the charge of homicide against Prince Bonaparte. He and the princess belonging to the Emperor's family, the examination must be held before this court. The journal, in its account of the transaction, says that the minister of justice, as soon as he heard of the affair, ordered the arrest of the prince, but he had surrendered himself into the custody of the commissioner of police Teril, and had been taken to the Conciergerie before the issuance of the order for his arrest.

JUAN COUNTY.—Elder Samuel Pitchforth of Nephi City, has paid us a short visit, and borne his testimony in relation to matters in general in Juan County. At Nephi the people are prosperous and comfortable. Co-operation is thriving, and the dividend lately declared amounted to four per cent. per month, and would have been larger but for a quantity of old stock, bought at high rates, still remaining unsold. This dividend was exclusive of a large quantity of grain on hand and a building owned by the shareholders.

The members of the Female Relief Society gave parties on the evenings of the 5th and 7th instant, in behalf of their institution, in the Social Hall, which was elegantly decorated with mottoes, paintings and fine specimens of their own work, such as quilts, etc. The ladies did the honors on the occasion, and conducted the affair with great order. No gentlemen were entitled to numbers, the ladies having entire control. Sperry's band was engaged for the occasion and discoursed most eloquently. President Higler and the authorities of the city were present, and there was a first rate time, the characteristics of the affair being peace and good order.

Schools are receiving a good share of support in Nephi, the number constantly increasing. Bro. W. R. May is very successfully conducting a fine select school. His school room is well provided with maps and globes and the best educational works, from which instruction is imparted on the most approved methods.

Levan and Moon are also doing well; the new meeting-house at the former was dedicated on Christmas day, since which time several parties have been held within its walls. The citizens of Levan are prospering, and are pleased with the location of their settlement.
