COST OF SCHOOLS IN OCDEN

Estimated to Require \$103,500 to Run Schools er also. For Coming Year.

According to the estimate submitted last night by the finance committee of the board of education and adopted by that body, at its meeting last night, the amount of money necessary to operate the public schools of the city of Ogden for the year 1903-4 is \$103,500. Of the amount \$69,500 is to be raised by local taxation, while \$34,000 is expected from

the state and county school taxes. The superintendent submitted an estimate of the supplies required for the year by janitors, and also a list of gen-

eral school supplies, and bids were ask-ed for to be in by May 15. Earl Cardoe, a member of the class of 1903 of the High school, appeared as a representative of the class and asked that the board change the date of the High school commencement exercises to some other time than June 1, the reason being that some of the teachers cannot attend on that date. The board took matter under advisement.

Principal Wilson of the High school submitted a program for commence-ment exercises. The general features of program were accepted and Mr Wilson was designed to make the dress to the graduates and present the diplomas.
