

ROOSEVELT'S REFORMS

PAISED BY MR. BRYAN.

Memphis, Tenn., Jan. 6.—A banquet at which 40 covers were spread was tendered William J. Bryan tonight by the Jackson club of Memphis. Mr. Bryan was introduced as the next president of the United States. His subject was, "Watchman, What of the Night?" After speaking of the causes which, in part, contributed to the recent defeat of the Democratic party, Mr. Bryan said the platform adopted at Kansas City expressed the views of more Democrats than any platform adopted since. He praised several recommendations made by President Roosevelt, and spoke of him as doing many good things. Mr. Bryan closed as follows: "Just now, President Roosevelt gives promise of beginning a reform movement. He recommends legislation

which will inform the public in regard to the campaign contributions. This is a far-reaching recommendation, and should receive the earnest support of every Democrat. He also recommends an enlargement of the scope of the interstate commerce law. "This, too, is a step in the right direction, and he should receive the support of all Democrats in any efforts which he makes to bring the railroads under a strict control. If the president, with the aid of the Democrats, accomplishes any reform, the public will secure the benefit of it; if, even with Democratic aid, he fails, the educational work which he does will help the Democratic party in the future contests. "In municipal affairs, the Democrats are, as they should be, quite unanimous in favor of municipal ownership of all municipal franchises, and our party must face the fact that a failure properly to regulate the railroads will compel the public ownership of the rail-

roads. If the federal government operates only the trunk lines, leaving the states to operate the network of local lines, we can have public ownership without centralization, and, as I believe, without danger to any public interests. "Shot at Wife, Then Himself. Seattle, Wash., Jan. 6.—Matthew H. Conners, a former employee at the courthouse, fired three shots at his wife this afternoon and then shot himself through the head. His wife received but a slight wound in the arm. Conners lived until he reached the hospital. Family troubles caused the trouble. "Gabo Coal Mine in Mont. Closed. Red Lodge, Mont., Jan. 6.—The Gabo coal mine is closed on a second restraining order made by Judge Frank Henry, on complaint of Atty.-Gen. Jas. Donovan. The complaint alleges that the mine is unsafe in regard to ventila-

tion. A previous restraining order against the Gabo mine, issued at the instance of the attorney-general, was dissolved, because directed against the wrong corporations. "JOCKEY KILLED. In a London Theater in a Mimed Derby Race. London, Jan. 6.—At the Coliseum, the largest music hall in London, and which was opened a fortnight ago, a vivid representation of the Derby is reproduced by a revolving stage. Tonight Jockey Dent, riding the outside horse, attempted to pull across, but his horse stumbled on the footwork surrounding the revolving platform and rolled over the proscenium into the orchestra. Dent was thrown violently on his head and was taken to a hospital unconscious, where he died soon afterward. Another fatal accident occurred at the Coliseum during a rehearsal prior to the opening of the house.

"Gold Bars for Japan. New York, Jan. 6.—A million dollars in gold certificates was deposited in the United States sub-treasury in this city by a New York firm of brokers, who will draw a similar amount in gold bars from the San Francisco mint for shipment to Japan. "Ohio Stockholders' Liability. Akron, O., Jan. 6.—Judge George Hayden today rendered a decision in the state bankruptcy case of the Aullman-Miller company, affecting more than a million dollars' worth of stock. Many stockholders demurred to paying the double liability obligation, on the ground that the recent amendment to the constitution in that connection absolved them, because the failure oc-

curred after the amendment was adopted. On the principle that the debts were incurred and the company was in existence before the amendment abolishing the double liability was adopted, Hayden held the stockholders must stand for double the value of their shares. "The question will be carried to the supreme court, and if the decision is sustained there it will affect at least \$50,000,000 worth of stock in Ohio. "DIAMONDS SMUGGLED IN. Seems to Have Been for Benefit of Mrs. Chadwick. Cleveland, Jan. 6.—The Plaindealer tomorrow will say: "The investigation into the charge that large quantities of diamonds and jewels were smuggled into this country

by persons returning from Europe with Mrs. Cassie L. Chadwick has resulted in the finding by United States officers of some \$50,000 worth of gems and diamonds. "Some of the diamonds are in safety deposit vaults in Cleveland and New York. The reason that immediate seizure is not ordered is explained by the fact that formal identification is necessary.
