MONROE CONVICTED OF ZANG ROBBERY.

Trial of George Wells Begun—Efforts to Quash Information And Dismiss Case.

TWO MISSIONARY FAREWELLS.

Wedding of Miss Cora Wilson—Other Marriage Licenses—Kruitbosch Re-committed to Mental Hospital.

The case of the State of Utah against John Monroe, charged with the robbery of the Zang saloon on Oct. 20, 1903, was completed before Judge Rolapp yesterday afternoon, and was submitted to the jury at about 4 o'clock, who after being out about twenty minutes, brought in a verdict of guilty as charged, and the court set Thursday morning at 10 o'clock as the time for sentence. The case has occupied three days in the district court. It was contended by the state that while Monroe did not actually take part in the holdup of the saloon, he assisted in planning the affair and furnished the men with guns and was otherwise implicated. District Atty. Halverson represented the state in the action and Soren X. Christensen the defendant.

TRIAL OF GEORGE WELLS. In the case of the State of Utah vs. George Wells, proprietor of the O. K. saloon, charged with being implicated in the robbery of the Zang saloon on October 20, 1903, the defendant's attorney, J. D. Murphy, moved, that Soren X. Christensen be associated as attorney in the case. The motion was granted. Atty. Murphy then moved that the information charging the defendant with the crime mentioned be quashed on the following grounds: First, that the complaint is ambiguous and unintelligible, second, that no specific complaint was filed with the committing magistrate, third, that the information charging the defendant with the crime was sworn to before the clerk of the municipal court instead of the municipal judge as required by law; third, that the magistrate before whom the case was heard failed to sign the order binding the defendant over to the district court. Fourth, that the case was not signed by the judge, but by the magistrate before whom the case was heard. The court continued the case until this morning so that the attorneys for both sides may present their authorities for the grounds set forth in their application to quash.
