TRIAL OF GEORGE WELLS. In the case of the State of Utah vs George Wells, proprietor of the O. K. saloon, charged with being implicated in the robbery of the Zang saloon on October 20, 1903, the defendant's attorney, J. D. Murphy, moved that Soren X. Christensen be associated as attorney in the case. The motion was granted. Atty, Murphy then moved that the information charging the de-fendant with the crime mentioned be quashed on the following grounds. First, that the complaint is ambiguous and unintelligible, second, that no specinc complaint was filed with the committing magistrate for warrant of arrest; and that the information charg-ing the defendant with the crime was sworn to before the clerk of the municiudge as required by law; third, that he magistrate before whom the was heard failed to sign the order binding the defendant over to the district court. Fourth, that the magistrate before whom the case was heard, viz., Judge Howell, had lost his jurisdiction by transferring the case to another court. But the transfer was made at the request of the attorney for the defendant and then withdrawn at his request; fifth, that no certificed copy magistrate was filed with the clerk of the district, and the copy of the justice's docket is not signed by the judge before whom the preliminary hearing was had, and some of the names of wit-
