Recommends Changes in Management of Municipal Affairs and Crusade Against Vice.

#### Council Committees Appointed - Letter Boxes Located-J. G. Jost Jumps Bond-Beet Contracts.

Provo, Utah Co., Jan. 21 .- Mayor Taylor presented his inaugural message to the city council last evening. After urging the council to labor unitedly and without personal or sectional feeling, for the welfare and progress of the city he made the following recommendations: "Your attention is called to the fact.

that our bond deal has not, as yet, been consummated, and while we have hoped to settle this matter it still remains to be completed. Within the next few weeks we should be able to accomplish this, thereby saving the taxpayers \$2,000 per year in interest. is reduction and the steady increase water takers will make our water

system self-sustaining." The sinking fund should remain, which would within ten years pay one-half of the bonded indebtedness, and the water system should be improved either by springs being piped to the basin, or by a proper filtering system eing put in.

The present electric light system should be purchased or the city should put in a system, to be owned and conrolled by the city. The drive to the lake should be con-

structed. A paving district should be estab-A paying district should be estab-lished on Academy avenue from Center street to the railroad depot, and side-walks not paved should be graveled, and shale crossings made on the

In all road work shale should be used, that whatever is done may be permanent. Sewer districts should be ex-tended so that all the public schools could be connected with the sewer, and the sewer on Center street should be extended two blocks west to include all the busiless portions of the city.

The factory race should be covered. between Center street to First North and cleanliness in all outdoor surround-ings should be insisted upon. The city marshal should have your

hearty support in enforcement of or-dinances; too much care cannot be taken in guarding the young. Vice and crime should be stamped

vice and crime should be sumption out. Violation of the ordinances should be speadily dealt with. The liquor traffic should be kept within the or-dinance, and any support needed from dinance, and any support needed from you to this end should be given, as well as to the enforcement of all other or-dinances. Sunday liquor selling should be stopped. The support of every city officer should be given the marshal to this end. We have in our midst over one thousand students from other parts of the state and adjoining states, let our city government be an example to
