The Murderer Caught.

CREVLEND, April 27.—This morning
Fred Stoll, who was secretly arrested
last Tuesday, was charged with the
murder of Maggie McCarthy. The
prisoner's face was badly disfigured
and his trousers bloody. The police
claim they have a strong case of
circumstantial evidence against the
prisoner.

Circumstantial Evidence.

DUBUQUE, Iowa, April 27.—Late
yesterday afternoon the body of a
man apparently about 35 years of age
was found four miles north of this city.
Her clothes were torn and there were
several cuts on the head and hands.
The body was found by a farmer who
received word from a neighbor that
he had found a body.

The wife of a well-known dairy man,
Susan Kennedy, who lives near
Dubuque, was the first to be
alleged the couple had quarreled,
and this afternoon he was
found in the woods, on his coat, on
the sleeves of his shirt and on his vest
and trousers. When asked for an
explanation he refused to talk.

Vest's Denial.

NEW YORK, April 27.—Senator Geo.
C. Vest, of Missouri, is in this city.
When asked by a reporter for the
Commercial Advertiser to-day whether
or not, as has been alleged, he was the
western senator referred to in the
dispatch to the St. Louis Republic
authorizing the statement that Presi-

WASHINGTON, April 27.—The Marine

fore my duty to decline to grant the

CONCERNING FARES.

CHICAGO, April 27.—A meeting of
the lines in the western states passed
agreed to recognize and adopt the
general passenger and ticket agents of
the lines in the western states. The

that the differential fares now in effect
