Discovery of Fabulously Rich Ledges Only Twelve Miles Out of Waldo.

Waldo, Or., Aug. 22.—There is a great deal of excitement here over the dis-covery of several fabulously rich ledg-cs of a high quality of telluride, ore. The find occured but recently on Light-ning creek, some 12 miles from Waldo, and since the news was brought in, the whele vacinity has been in a flurry. Considerable development work is being done and the manage-ment is exceedingly well pleased with the remarkable results obtained. The gold values of this ore seem hardly credible. From reliable authority it is hearned that the formation of these claims is exactly the same as that of claims is exactly the same as that of Cripple Creek, and from all indica-tions, Oregon is liable to produce a camp that will beat them all.

THE WILLOW CREEK MINE.

Ogden People Interested in an Old Ne-vada Property of Note.

The "News" is informed that S. S. Smith and C. E. Hoffman, two enter-prising Ogden citizens, have joined the Gate City" contingent in the quest "Gate City" contingent in the quest for bonanza mining propositions in the wilds of Nevada, and that they have secured a two years' lease on the old Willow Creek mine in Washoe county, twelve mlles south of Reno, and six mlles north of the wonderful Comstock mine at Virginia City. The property is located on the Virginia & Truckee railroad, and Messis. Smith and Hoff-man will bégin work about the first of September in its systematic opera-

The State Journal, of Ogden, in speak-ing of the Willow Creek mine, says: More than \$100,000 was expended about twenty years ago by ex-Governor Stevenson in developing this prop-erty, but owing to excessive freight rates at that time and the fact that the ore carried a small per cent of zinc and sulphur, it could not be shiped and treated at a profit. Upon the death of the owner of the prop-erty his estate became involved in litigation which has only been recently settled. Hence the mine has been idle

Messrs. Smith and Hoffman have had several analyses of the ore made and upon them have received a favor-able bid for the ore from the Murray employee the several sev able bid for the ore from the Murray smelters, also very reasonable freight rates from the mine to the smelters, and are confident of a reasonable pro-fit in working the mine. Their as-says have abown from 30 to 65 ounces silver and from 25 to 55 per cent lead, and a small amount of gold. On the penalty side of the sheet the assays show but little zine and speiss with about 10 per cent of insolubles and the same amount of sulphur.

A PECULIAR DISCOVERY.

A Great Cave Found in the Southern

Cross Mine in Nevada. A most peculiar discovery, made by some prospectors in Nevada, has just come to light. Upon exploration it was found that the shots had broken through into a cavern, 100 feet long and 80 feet wide. The ledge had completely disappeared and they found themselves in what appeared to be an underground water-course. The cave presented no outlet nor could any trace of ore be found. The bottom was covered with gravel and coarse black sand. A quantity of this sand was panned and was found to contain considerable gold. This en-couraged the men to sink in bedrock, where they found many small nuggets, shift they have since taken out over \$3,000 in the precious metal. They now intend to drift along the bedrock of this wonderful cavern, which seems to be filled with hidden treasure.

TO WORK THE RENO MINE.

Company to be Organized to Operate

Mr. Newport is a thoroughgoing mine operator of wide experience, having been identified with a number of suc-cessful mining ventures in the north-west and at present engaged in opening a coal mine in British Columbia. Mr. Newport desired an in-terest in one of the future wealth pro-ducers of the world famous lead-silver camp, and after careful investigation decided to invest in the Reno, which is ionity owned by Mr. Prove and One-lea Jointly owned by Mr. Ryan and Charles Eccles. The Reno abutts the west end line of the Copper King and is tra-versed by 4,500 feet of the west exten-sion of the King ledge. Messra. Ryan and Eccles recently explored the ledge by means of a series of open cuts, this work exposing a velo capping of por-phyry and quartz carrying lead, silver and copper values. They are now driving a 200 foot crosscut tunnel to tap the ledge 180 feet below the outgrop. the ledge 180 feet below the outgrop, Four miners are employed, and the tunnel will be finished October 15. The Reno has water power facilities and ample timber for mine use and building purposes. In all essential features, the Reno is not wanting. Messrs. New-port and Ryan went to Spokane yester-day, where they will incorporate the Reno Mining company under the laws of Washington.
