

## RUSSIANS READY FOR THE JAPANESE.

Prepared to Give Them a Warm Reception the Next Time They Appear Off Port Arthur.

## A BIG FLEET FOR MAKAROFF.

Battleships and Cruisers Will Be Sent Him During the Coming Summer.

Port Arthur, April 3.—Preparations have been made to give the Japanese a warm reception in case they again attempt to block the harbor. Vice Admiral Togo was right in surmising that Vice Admiral Makaroff is responsible for the change in Russian naval tactics and for the inspiration of Russian seamen. A signalman named Andronenko, who during the bombardment of Vladivostok, remained at a small signal station on Askold Island near the enemy's ships and wired information of the movements of the enemy to the forts has been decorated with the cross of St. George.

TRANSPORTS FOR SEOUL.  
Seoul, Korea, April 3 (Ap. m.)—Five Japanese transports carrying light artillery, cavalry and infantry have arrived at Chemulpo. The men are en route for Seoul.

YINKOW IS SAFE.

St. Petersburg, April 3.—A correspondent at Yinkow says the opinion prevails there that the Japanese will not bombard that place, because 99 per cent of the population is made up of Chinese, who are not at war with Japan, and because a shell from the Japanese ships would be sure to strike the residence of the United States consul, who is safeguarding Japanese interests.

THE SAME CORRESPONDENT humorously describes the speculation among the British correspondents there as to whether the victorious Japanese after defeating the Russian army will stop in China or go to Irkutsk.

BIG FLEET FOR MAKAROFF.

St. Petersburg, April 3.—As soon as the Neva is clear of ice the battleship Suvoroff and Slava, in course of construction at the Baltic works, the battleship Rodionov and Orel, at the Panteleimonovskaya works and the cruiser Mager and the transport Kamchatka, at the new admiralty yard, will be sent to Kronstadt for completion. The cruisers Zhemchug and Izumrud and the battleships Sissoi Volki and Imperator Alexander III are already under way and are being prepared for commission. These ships will form part of the fleet which is destined to reinforce Vice Admiral Makaroff's fleet next summer.

NO FRESH ATTACK ON PORT ARTHUR.

Rumors to the effect that Lieutenant General Anatol Michailovitch Stoessel has been relieved of the command of Port Arthur have for some time been rife. Whatever may occur in the future, however, he is still in charge of the land forces there. Stoessel is an engineer officer and is therefore peculiarly fitted for his present command. During the march of the allies to Peking in 1900 his troops fought side by side with the Japanese.

pendent of the Associated Press at Port Arthur telegraphs today as follows:

"The Chinese, prophesying new attempts to block the channel, are at the present moment awed."

"All is quiet in Port and the situation is unchanged throughout the peninsula. Deposits of coal similar to that of Cardiff, Wales, have been found in the vicinity of Port Arthur. The discovery is an extremely timely one, in view of the necessity of obtaining an ample supply of fuel for the fleet."

"Indignation prevails here over the publication by the daily press of Hongkong of untrue reports concerning Russia and of victories by the Japanese, which excite the Chinese against Russia."

"During the inspection made by Vice-roy Alexieff he visited the battery on Electric cliff and presented to the commander an old bronze cross sent by a Moscow woman, who requested that it be erected on the most dangerous part of the fortress."

JAPANESE PRISONERS.

Taitshar, Manchuria, March 23.—The Associated Press correspondent met here the first batch of Japanese prisoners taken during the war, who are en route to Chita, where they will be detained. The prisoners include a major of the Japanese general staff, his wife and a maid and seven soldiers, who were captured in Korea by Cossacks. They were heavily guarded and appeared to be greatly depressed and

COUNT IN NOME JAIL.  
Charged With Attempt to Kill Capt. Wm. Galpin.

Seattle, Wash., April 4.—A special from Nome to the Post-Intelligencer says: Count and Countess Morawski have been brought to this city and the count has been placed in jail and the countess in a hospital. The couple are charged with robbery and the countess is also charged with assault to kill Capt. William Galpin, formerly a northwest mounted police captain. The countess is suffering from nervous prostration due to troubles arising over alleged theft of an unpublished manuscript entitled "The Dawson Widow." Galpin avers he is the author and the countess as vigorously asserts it is hers. At Holy Cross mission, on the Yukon, the countess tried to shoot Galpin, but missed. The countess figured in a sensational divorce case in Chicago a few years ago. She was the wife of Dr. E. E. Higby of that city, and later was married to Col. Crane of Los Angeles, whom she deserted to go to the Klondike. The countess was recently apprised that he had fallen heir to an estate and title in Russia.

TROOPS LEAVE TELLURIDE.  
Less Than a Hundred Are Now At the Camp.

Denver, Colo., April 3.—According to special dispatches from Telluride, all of the troops sent there when martial law was re-established 10 days ago, with the exception of the Meeker cavalry and the home troop, left the camp today under orders to proceed to their home stations. This leaves less than 100 militiamen at Camp Telluride. The remainder of the troops, two special trains and with them were five military prisoners and seven others, deported by orders of the military. They were taken as far as Ridgeway and instructed to remain away from Telluride. Several of the deported men had previously been evicted and had returned to Telluride under protection of the injunction issued by Judge Theron Stevens of Ouray. It is said that the five prisoners referred to had requested Adj. Gen. Bell to order their removal from the district so that they might secure their freedom from confinement.

Gen. Bell still remains in Telluride and in active command of the troops. Three of the men deported by the citizens of Telluride on March 14, returned last night and thus far have not been interfered with. President Moyer of the Western Federation of Miners, who was arrested by Sheriff Rutan of Telluride on the charge of deserting the flag, is still a prisoner, although enjoying a measure of freedom. He is allowed to occupy quarters at the hotel under guard.

The report of an understanding having been reached between the mine operators and the unions for a settlement of the strike in San Miguel county is denied by all the mine managers. Several go so far as to say that they will not deal with the unions in any capacity. Members and officials of the Telluride union assert that there was a possibility of settling the present trouble in the near future, but the action of the military today in sending more unionists out of Telluride has so licensed their brethren that further negotiations are useless.

## A RUSSIAN CIRCULAR.

## CORRUPTION IN MILWAUKEE.

Ten Indictments Are Returned Against City Officials.

Milwaukee, April 3.—The indictments returned by the grand jury at its final session are directed against 10 individuals, the list being as follows:

August Puls, supervisor; Herr Haensch, chairman board of supervisors; William C. Wegner, supervisor; Jacob Schulz, supervisor; Louis R. Stillberg, plumbing contractor; J. Marion, Adam Kreuter, of Chicago; Edward Strauss, supervisor; Joseph A. Schunk, formerly supervisor; Adam Moeder.

The testimony upon which the indictments were brought related to alleged illegal acts in connection with work on the county hospital. The original estimate on the cost of the building was \$80,000, while the actual cost was \$175,000. The building is still incomplete and more money will have to be expended.

## NEW YORK FOR PARKER.

Delegation to St. Louis Will be Instructed for Him.

Albany, N. Y., April 3.—From a source so close to former Senator Hill that it may be understood as representing Mr. Hill's views, it is learned that it is intended that the New York state delegation to the Democratic national convention at St. Louis shall be positively instructed in favor of Judge Alton B. Parker as New York's choice for the presidential nomination.

Senator Hill and his friends now be-

lieve that he will control three-fourths of the state convention, which will be held here April 13.

It has been during recent years an almost unbroken custom for the New York state Democratic delegation to go to the national convention with positive instructions. Only in 1884 were there no instructions. In that year Grover Cleveland and Roswell P. Flower, both New York statesmen, were candidates. The New York delegation voted for Cleveland.

## Domingans Out of Ammunition.

Cape Taylen, April 3.—A dispatch received here from Monte Cristo, Santo Domingo, reports that Gen. Epifanio Rodriguez, being without ammunition, abandoned the town and embarked on the German steamer Hispania for St. Thomas. This news is confirmed by the Dominican consul here.

It is rumored that Gen. Rodriguez and Navarro, having abandoned President Morales, are trying to start a movement in favor of former President Horacio Vasquez. They are now believed to be marching on Santiago de los Caballeros and Pavia, H. R.

A score of Dominican refugees, arrested here were sent back to Santo Domingo today by the Dominican consul.

## Improve Young St. Petersburgers

New York, April 4.—Announcement has been made by the international committee of the Y. M. C. A. that James Stokes of this city has forwarded an offer of \$50,000 to the society for the moral improvement of young men in St. Petersburg. One of the condi-

tions named by Mr. Stokes is that \$100,000 more be raised in Russia, the whole to form a fund for the erection of a building for the society. That the money will be raised is not doubted, as many of the leading men in Russia are interested in the movement. The head of the society is Prince Oldenbourg, a close relative of the emperor. Mr. Stokes took the initiative in establishing the society in St. Petersburg in 1897. The movement has received permission from the government to extend its branches throughout Russia.

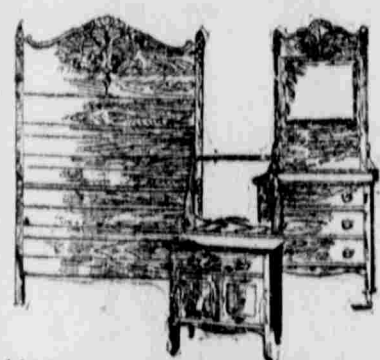

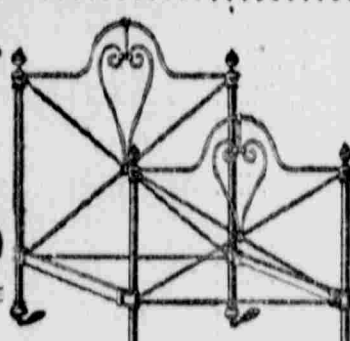

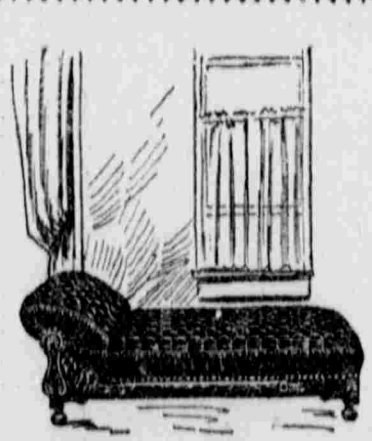
