A new apparatus for heating railway cars has just been tried on the Michigan Southern Railroad. It consists of a series of pipes, passing along the sides and beneath the seats of the cars, connected with a cylinder tank inclosing a coal-burning heater, and partly filled with water, which is gradually converted into heated vapor, which readily passes through the pipes, circulating through them, and returning to the tank, imparting heat to every part of the car in proportion to the temperature to which the vapor is raised. The apparatus is capable of holding enough coal and enough water to last 24 hours, and is said to require little or no attention during the trip. It is reported to have served its purpose admirably in the trial that has been made.
