What He is Doing at the Naval Academy-Some Specimens from His Vocabulary-The Rough Road the "Plebe" Has to Travel-He May Not Even Look at a "Youngster"-"Regs" and "Non-Regs"-Largest Class That Ever Entered is Just Beginning its First Year - Outline of Duties and Customs.

"Rate" is a word which the new arrival at Annapolis learns has a special and important meaning in the na-val academy. It is used as a transitive and intransitive verb, and its object, where used intransitively, in reference to a new midshipman, is "nothing." If to a new midshipman, is "nothing." It might be defined as "having a right to," and the new boy finds that he has no rights outside the bare necessities of his labors. He rates nothing. The senior class rates "the Lover's lane," which is one of the walks through the campus: the "plebe" is forbidden to tread this sacred ground under penal-ties most dire. What those penalties are he will learn from some visiting upper classmen during the midnight hours if he wishes to satisfy his curi-osity. Usually he accepts human tes-timony on this point. It

The "plebe" does not "rate" the benches on the campus; he does not "rate" any girl except relatives; there are certain bricks in the walk which he does not "rate;" and the prohibition extends to the amusement craft on the hey and even to having his memo in extends to the amusement craft on the bay, and even to having his name in the peak of his cap. But the humilia-tion of the "plebe" goes still further. He may not look at any upper class-man. A cat has a traditional right to look at a king; but a "plebe" may not look at a 'youngster." "Take your eyes off me!" is what he may hear if he chances to allow his glance to rest upon a passing upper classman. He is supposed to look at the wail. If there is one handy. Also

the wall, if there is one handy. Also the "piebe" is compelled to stand at attention when an upper classman comes within reasonable distance. It makes no difference what the "plebe" may be doing, or with whom he may be, his mother, his sister, or his cousin, he must stiffen himself into a ramroa and stand with hands at sides and eyes directly ahead until his superior has passed

"Reg" and "non-reg" are also words which are added to his vocabulary. His shoes must be "reg," that is regular, or he will be called to account. Everyhe will be called to account. Every-thing on and about him is prescribed, and anything "non-reg" is likely to get him into trouble. All tobacco or liquors are contraband; a watchrob is "non-reg" for a "plebe;" no furniture or bric-a-brac is "reg" in his room, ex-cept that which is provided by the neademy. But the most unusual inclu-sion in this official classification is that of the girls whom the midshipman may the girls whom the midshipman may take to the dances which are given ev-ery two or three weeks in the acad-emy armory. The academy authorities have lists including, in addition to offi-cers' bouseholds, some 20 families liv-ing in the little town of Annapolis, and these girls the midshimmen may take apmen may take to the dances; all other townspeople are excluded. But sometimes love strays outside these lines. The academy had a excluded. romance a year or two ago in which a midshipman and a tailor's daughter figured. After graduation, he married the "non-reg" girl, and both died with-In the year, In the year, Hazing is called "running" at An-napolis. It is general, but not severe, It is the means by which the students enforce the unwritten laws which they have made for themselves, and which are passed down from class to class. The "running" is calculated also to put the boys to the test, individually, and to bring out to their fellows their true characters. It consists largely in the setting the underclassman to un dignified and embarrassing tasks. For example, the "plebe" is surprised by an unannounced visitor, who com-mands him to stand at attention. Then he is concerned at attention. For he is ordered to tell his visitor a story. If the story is not satisfactory he is made to "hunt for the point," which he does literally, all about the room, like a dog after rats. Then he is made to stand on his head, or to hang from his locker, or to raise and lower the weight his body 16 times by using one leg. He generally topples over before complishing this. The "heading" sometimes varied by having the victim put his head into his washbowl, or he may sit in his washbowl and row with toothpicks. Sometimes he must sing the letters of his name to the tune of "Old Hundred." good story is told of a stuttering "plebe" who was accosted by an upper calssman and ordered to tell him a story and to tell it quick. Ther are 320 "middles," ranging in age from 15 to 20 years. All but one are from the United States, as bounded by its historic limits; one is a native Hawailan. This is the season of the year when the naval cadets of the new class at Annapolis are learning how to be def-erential to their elders. Boys in other schools may like some account of this branch of instruction. With the autumn months the upper classmen come back from their cruise. They realize the constant temptation which assails the new midshipmen, to "become fresh," and they have kindly provided measures to keep them in their proper frame of mind. These

The first week or two finds the new middle with eight blisters on each hand and every muscle in his body stiff and sore. Unless he is rather strong he probably has fainted while standing attention, which means as stiff as a ram-rod and as still as a stone, he finds harder than he imagined. And fainting harder than he imagined. And fainting brings him no sympathy. He gets a dash of water in the face, and when he comes too, he is stood up in the line again to stand out his time. And his meals are not as good as he had at home. For breakfast he gets rolls, coffee, bolled meat which he often does not eat, bluish milk and oatmeal, all the year round. He fares better at dinner, but the supper is like breakfast. These meals are provided at a cost of about 10 cents each, and this is de-ducted from a salary of \$500, which he is paid by the government while at the academy. His clothes also, which are all prescribed, are furnished by the government and the cost deducted from all prescribed, are furnished by the government and the cost deducted from the annual allowance. By autumn the members of the new class have learned to drill, and have become familiar with the discipline and customs of the academy. They have all been fitted with their uniforms, and have learned to "brace," that is to square up their shoulders until they can scarcely be distinguished from the upper-class men.
