## THE CHURCH HOLDS THE KEYS

Revealed Plan of Salvation Contemplates Redemption of Man from The Fall of Adam.

Elders Alex. Buchanan, Jr., and Joseph E. Taylor were the speakers at the tabernacle yesterday afternoon, the former devoting his remarks chiefly to an exposition of the cardinal principles of the gospel, while the latter pointed

Park and Joseph Keddington offered the opening and closing prayers. Elder Buchanan quoted the Second, Third and Fourth Articles of Faith, and said in part:

CHRIST LEARNED OBEDIENCE.

CHERST LEARNED OBEDIENCE. The Christian world generally believe in the gospel of Jesus Christ, but there are different conceptions as to what is necessary for salvation, and He learned obedience to the will of the Father by what He suffered. Only through obedi-ence to the commandments of the Re-deemer can we expect to have fellow-ship with Him. The plan of salvation requires a compliance with every pre-cept given of the Lord, and the blood of Jesus Christ does not become effica-cious until men render obedience to the cious until men render obedience to the commandments of the Lord. The same requirements are exacted of men and vomen now as in former time.

#### FUNDAMENTALS.

The fundamental principle of the gospel are faith, repentance, baptism by immersion for the remission of sins, and the **laying** on of hands for the gift of the **Holy** Ghost. These doctrines remained unchanged in all ages. So es-sential were they considered by the Son of God that He held Himself not above rendering obedience thereto, even to going down into the water to be bap-tized of John. Men may decry these things and declare them to be unnecessary, but the Scriptures emphatically pronounce them to be essential. As on the day of Pentecost the com-

mandment of repentance and baptism were proclaimed unto all, so now the same message is being preached to men and women in every part of the civil-ized world.

Mormonism is all embracing in its character, entering into every phase of man's existence and making him better in every way. The blessings of the gos-pel are daily in evidence among the Latter-day Saints, and as they grow in faith, the promised blessings increase.

# JOHNSON MAY RECOVER.

Man Shot by Bozen at Murray Has Chance to Live,

That Christ Johnson, the man shot by James Bozen at Murray Saturday afternoon, will recover is the opinion expressed today by the attending expressed today by the attending physician, Dr. Rothwell, He says from the nature of the wound, it might be thought that recovery was impossible, but no vital parts were touched by the bullet, he said, and the man gives every indication of getting well.

The knife with which Sullivan attacked Prussing can not be found and the prison of-ficials are mystified over the affair. Saturday afternoon, about 5 o'clock, as Prussing was on his way to the washroom from his cell, Sullivan, who was in waiting for him, sprang upon the man and struck him just under the chin with a knife. Prussing fought the desperado off and ran dewn the corridor toward the guard. Demming was also waiting for Prussing and tried to head him off so that Sullivan could finish his murderous work. He struck Prussing, knocking him down and knocking out two teeth. Prussing final-ly managed to reach the guard. Prison officials rushed upon the two desperate convicts and overpowered them. They were taken before Warden Pratt and Sullivan sullenly said he "lost his head," but Demming refused to talk. Both were placed in solitary confine-ment. Prussing was not hadly in-jured, the cut under his chin is pain-ful but not serious.

## FEVER STILL SPREADING.

Health Authorities Not Successful in Checking Progress of Disease.

Again the feature of the report of the city board of health is the number of new cases of scarlet fever developing, 16 new cases being reported during the last seven-day period. Beyond putting up the flag and taking quarantine pre-cautions with cares reported, the health department has evidently been unable

department has been unselective been unselected to do anything to quell the sprace of the disease. In the matter of births, the boys lead the girls by four. Following is the weekly report of the city board of health for the week ending May 22, toos.

Thirty-six births were reported du

Thirty-six births were reported dur-ing the week; 22 males and 14 females. Elighteen deaths were reported during the week; 15 males and 8 females. Five were shipped here for burial. There were reported during the week 32 cases of contagion and infectious diseases consisting of 2 cases of small-pox, 16 cases of scarlet fever, 1 case of diphtheria, 5 cases of whooping cough, 4 cases of measles, 2 cases of puenno-nia, 1 case of typhoid fever and 1 case of pulmonary tuberculosis. Three cases nin, i case of cylindric test. Three cas of pulmonary tuberculosis. Three cas of smallpox remain at the isolation hu pital. Thirty-seven houses, account searlet fever and 2 houses account diphtherin remain in quarantine the ending of the week.

## WANTED IN MISSOURI.

The man was arrested at Ogden, charged with a stat-utory crime alleged to have been com-mitted at Jackson. Mo. He was held by the Junction City authorities until the arrival of Sheriff Bernard Gockel, and that officer brought his prisoner to Sait Lake and had him placed in safe keeping until the requisition is boored. About a month ago Gregory married an Ogden girl, and she will accompany him to Missourf, and will stand by him while he fights the charge against him.
