Editor Descript News, Dear Brothers In reply to your inquiry about Fish Spectrum, my experience and sequalitance with the fisheries in Provo river and Utah Lake, en-able me to say that the small mountain trout commence to spawn early in March, but the best quality of trout, or what is called the White Lake Trout, spawn in April. The best time to obtain spawn is about the middle of April. The trout can then be caught on the spawning ground in PROVO, June 1, 1868. then be caught on the spawning ground in the Provo river, or in clear streams and clean gravel, for they never spawn among mud.
