SHIELDS FINED \$100 For His Part in the Assault on a Policeman at Seattle.

## FILINGS ON 636 HOMESTEADS.

Over 100,000 Acres Located on Reservation—Only One-Half Respond to Call.

NO TOWNSITES SOLD AS YET.

Everybody at Sea on Problem of Irrigation—Speculators Querying Situation—Settlers Organizing.

Special Correspondence.

Vernal, Utah, Co., Sept. 8.—At the close of office hours at the land office here today, 636 homestead filings had been made on Utah reservation lands out of a total of 1,304 numbers called. Out of the 11 numbers called today, 25 made filings.

Approximately 100,000 acres of land has now been located, pretty nearly all of which has been made on the north and east sides of the Duchesne river. As yet very few have located on the benches south of the river, although there are many thousands of acres of fine land there, which will, however, be more expensive to irrigate than the north side, except possibly the Blue Bench country, which will be irrigated from Rock Creek.

Although the main portion of the big tracts on the north side have been located, there still remains here and there, good locations, and parties with high numbers are out scouting around the reservation locating these isolated tracts in their maps, and expect to file on them when their turn comes. Here and there throughout the reservation, sandwiched in among the Indian allotments are a number of pieces of good land, which have been located in the past, because of the fact that the locators would be surrounded by Indians.

As the filing proceeds, it becomes evident that the figures given out by the Utah County Bureau of Land and Irrigation, relative to the irrigable lands of the reservation was not far wide of the truth. The bureau published a statement that the whole 100,000 acres of land on the reservation susceptible of irrigation outside the Indian allotments, 100,000 acres of which was on the north and south of the Duchesne river. Added to this is 50,000 acres, which lies on the old Uinta-pah reservation, south of the Utah reservation, which is one of the finest tracts in the entire basin.

One peculiar situation has developed in connection with the opening and that is because of the fact that the locators in the different townships have not yet been sold, everything is in the air, waiting where the main town of the new country will be, and the new towns that were to spring into existence are suspended for the time being. No one seems to know just yet where the town of the new country will be, and the new towns that were to spring into existence are suspended for the time being.

There have been several meetings held lately by the settlers of the reservation, for the purpose of getting together for mutual protection. There seems to be a general feeling of uneasiness among the settlers, and the many filings that have been made by persons and companies for the water, and these meetings are for the purpose of getting the people into some kind of an organization for mutual protection.

Some people are endeavoring to create an impression that these companies are in some way taking advantage of the "Mormon" Church for the purpose of creating an excitement, and thereby profiting themselves, through fees, in prospecting, etc.

At a meeting held last night, a long set of articles of incorporation, styled the Utah Power and Water company, was presented, with a long list of officers, and among them was a company attorney. It was noticeable that those most interested in the incorporation were attorneys with no interests on the reservation whatsoever. After a rather spirited debate, the whole matter was laid over for future action, much to the disgust of some of the most active boomers of the scheme.

Dr. Elliott Harris of Salt Lake was a rather disappointed applicant last Wednesday. He came all the way from New York to file on a farm, having registered at the Oregon Junction on his way east, but arrived here at a few hours too late, having been delayed by a washout on the Rio Grande road. This morning after the day he should have filed he went to the land office and pleaded to allow his entry to be made, but Register De Moisy could not see his way clear to admit it, so he was turned down.

There is talk of calling a mass meeting of the citizens of the whole Utah basin to adopt resolutions, expressive of a general sentiment in favor of memorializing Congress, in regard to an extension of the time when settlers on the reservation must establish their residence, from six months to nine months or a year. The time as now fixed under the law, will make it necessary for locators to establish their homes on the reservation at one of the hardest times of the year, in February and March. No doubt a strong petition will be framed and sent to the Utah delegation in Congress, covering the matter.

The inhabitants of this section of the state were startled yesterday by a local crash, which sounded like a terrific explosion. It occurred about 8 o'clock in the morning. The report was so loud that people rushed out of their houses to ascertain the cause. Some were under the impression that it was an earthquake, so severe was the jar that accompanied it. It is quite generally believed that it was at one of the phosphate mines, and that another terrible dust explosion had occurred. Many thought it was at the Paria phosphate mine, south of Myton. Up to the present writing no word has reached here that explains the mysterious shock.
