

**JOHN L. SULLIVAN--
CHAS. MITCHELL.**

Good Chance for the Humane Officer to Get in His Work.

HAS BEEN STILL TALKING.

Old Timers Declare Their Intention to Meet in the Roped Area in the Near Future.

These two old "has-beens," John L. Sullivan and Charley Mitchell, are still talking fight and ask a patient public to listen to their gabfest. If ever a match has been ridiculed by the sporting public and scoffed at by the wise ones this one has both of the men have been out of the ring so long that pugilistically speaking they are dead and buried, and nothing short of a miracle will resurrect them. The present day fighters, however, are an entirely different class and depend on speed and science to win for them. It is safe to say that Charley Mitchell is not John L. Sullivan would have been a plaything, even when he was at his best, simply because he could not hit the fighter of today; and the only reason that he is in the ring at the present time is ridiculous.
