## LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

FROM TUESDAY'S DAILY.

**MORE SOLDIERS.**—Another company of soldiers arrived last night, they were from Fort Bridger.

**GEN. MORROW.**—This highly respected officer arrived in town last evening. His appearance indicates the possession of good health.

**THE LIQUOR CASE.**—Yesterday in the Supreme Court, the appealed case of Engelbrecht vs. Salt Lake City, was decided, and the judgment of the District Court affirmed. The case will be appealed to the Supreme Court of the United States.

**MAYOR WELLS ARRESTED.**—At twenty minutes past three this afternoon, just as we were going to press, U. S. Marshal Patrick served a writ upon and arrested Mayor D. H. Wells, on a charge of "lascivious and unlawful cohabitation."

**GRASSHOPPER RAVAGES** are not confined to the Rocky Mountains and the Pacific coast. In Maine, Massachusetts, Vermont, and Pennsylvania much injury has been done to crops the past season. If the grasshoppers begin their ravages in the mountains, they won't end there. Utah and Montana have raised good crops the past season.

**WHY THEY COME.**—Some people wonder why more troops are sent to Utah. The reason is plain enough—there has been a little complaint of late that business is not quite so brisk as it was, and Uncle Sam, being in prosperous circumstances just now, notwithstanding the vast amount of official plundering constantly going on, has a little cash to spare for distribution in Utah. It will all make it better for business. Uncle doesn't mean to slight Utah.

**WHAT IS IT ALL ABOUT?**—It said the soldiers who arrived in the city on Sunday night from Fort Steele, were called suddenly, by dispatch from the war department, to move this way. If this be true, what does it mean? Was it in accordance with a demand of the gophers of the corrupt "ring"? Those who outrage a people and trample upon their liberties must be in bodily fear lest they should really lay the "last feather on the camel's back."

**OUR DELEGATE TO CONGRESS.**—We were gratified at receiving a call yesterday afternoon from our Delegate, Hon. Wm. H. Hooper, who, with his family, has been passing the past eight weeks at Soda Springs. The waters of Soda have had an excellent effect upon his and family's health. Hon. Mr. Hooper, if his present health continue, will be in excellent condition to enter upon the labors of the next session of Congress, and to render those important services for which during so many years he has been conspicuous.

**APPLICATIONS FOR LAND PATENTS APPROVED.**—A dispatch dated New York, Oct. 2nd, says:

"The commissioner of the general land office has approved the applications for patenting the cash entries arising from the following townships in the Territory of Utah: Kayville, Springville, American Fork city, Bountiful, Centerville, Santaquin, Cedar Fort, Payson city, Mona, Ephraim city, Nephi and Levan."

**TAKE THEIR NAMES.**—It would be an excellent thing for the names of all those who are engaged in attempting to "harass the people" and "eat out their substance," to be taken and held in remembrance for future use. Somebody will have to pay the costs of all these unrighteous proceedings, with interest too. **NEWS.**—The following which came over the wires from Laramie, may create some surprise among the people of this city, and they will probably feel a little ashamed at not being better posted with regard to what is transpiring among themselves:

**LARAMIE, 1.**—The Laramie Sentinel publishes the following:

**GREAT EXCITEMENT—CIVIL WAR IN SALT LAKE!!—THE GENTILES AND FEDERAL OFFICIALS FLEEING FROM THE COUNTRY!!**—A report comes to us just as we were going to press, of an outbreak and

open rupture in Utah to-day. Our old friend Korty, who is now at Ogden, tells us that Brigham Young was to have been arrested this morning or an indictment for polygamy, but he has not learned whether the arrest was made or not. There is evidently great excitement there.

Later.—Korty telegraphs as follows at four o'clock p.m.

The editor of the Review [the Gentile paper at Salt Lake.—Ed.] has just this moment arrived here with his family, and his paper is suspended.

The Governor and his family have left Salt Lake and all the Gentiles who can get away are leaving with their families as fast as possible.

Brigham wanted to be tried to-day, but I don't know what has been done about it. The Mormons are powerful and only two weeks ago they bought a large lot of needle guns at auction at Camp Douglas. The officer in command did not know what he was doing. They say that all the Mormons are armed with needle guns, and one hundred rounds of cartridges, and are very loud with their threats.

It would appear from the above that we are in a terrible state of excitement and terrorism without knowing it. Before receiving the above dispatch we imagined all was peace here.

We understand that remittances can be made by international money orders, via Switzerland, to the principal towns of Austria, Hungary, Spain, Russia, Sweden, Denmark, Norway, Turkey, Greece, Egypt, the East Indies and China.

For the convenience of the public we republish the following rates of commission on orders to Great Britain or Ireland:

On orders not exceeding \$10, 25cts
Over \$10 and not exceeding \$20, 50 cts.
" \$20 " " " " \$30, 75 cts.
" \$30 " " " " \$40, \$1.00.
" \$40 " " " " \$50, \$1.25.

No single order issued for more than \$50.

Parties desiring to remit larger amounts must obtain additional orders.

I see since that my conversation has been greatly exaggerated in the Sentinel. Will you be kind enough to explain these facts? Your version of the difficulty will do much towards correcting those misrepresentations sent abroad over the W. U. line.

**WHAT WOULD BE THE RESULT.**—Should the corrupt ring succeed in bringing about the consummation they so devoutly wish—a rupture between the government and the people of this Territory, would not the result be disastrous from every standpoint? In considering this question we fail to see where such an event would be productive of the least benefit in any direction, and in any way, shape or form, and we believe every sensible person who has given the subject a moment's thought, cannot but come to the same conclusion. We do not refer to the matter, however, because we anticipate any such event will happen, for we are of a contrary belief. Yet the future may develop occurrences of which none may now have the slightest idea. There is one thing sure, that this community are desirous of living at peace with all men. In fact that is really the all-pervading and paramount feeling of the entire body of Latter-day Saints—to live at peace with all men, and in the enjoyment of the civil and religious rights guaranteed to them by the glorious constitution of our common country; and we do not state it too strongly when we say that there is no body of people dwelling under the broad banner of the Republic who are more desirous of sustaining by their actions the Constitution, and abiding by any constitutional law that may be enacted by the General Government. But the people of Utah demand also the rights and privileges which they are lawfully entitled to, and furthermore we say that, notwithstanding the present efforts that are being made to trample upon and crush them, they will ultimately enjoy them. We think that men of honor, sense and judgment will see to it, especially those having interests at stake in Utah and the surrounding region, that those interests be not endangered by political tricksters, and will quickly and effectively protest accordingly against the invidious efforts of the ring. Every person of honor and honesty, every lover of constitutional freedom, will take this course.
