MUST CLEAR SIDEWALKS

MUST CLEAR SIDEWALKS. The council passed a resolution re-quiring that all obstructions upon side-walks, not there lawfully, be at once removed, and instructing the chief of police to see that the ordinance is en-forced. This action was taken because it was alleged by some members that favoritism was shown to some hard-ware dealers and machine men in per-mitting the sidewalks to be used for advertising purposes. A motion to re-move all machinery was made by Mar-tin, and Black, who was accused of being responsible for the favoritism amended so as to include all obstruc-tions, even the stalls on Market Row, Fernstrom, Holley and Cowburn voted against the proposition, Holley chang-ing to aye, that he might move for a reconsideration. ing to aye, tha reconsideration.

#### FORFEIT VOTED DOWN.

Black, Fernstrom and Martin of the Black, Fernstrom and Martin of the finance committee recoddended that Davis Heuser & Drake be re-quired to forfeit \$650, for de-lay in the matter of paving extension No. 178. The board of public works made explanation that the con-tractors were not entirely to blame for the delay, and the motion to forfeit was lost by a vote of 11 to 2.
