GAME LAWS NOT ENFORCABLE ON MILITARY RESERVATIONS. Washington, Oct. 12 .-- According to an

order just issued by the war depart-ment, the fish and game laws of a state are not operative on a military reserva-tion over which the United States has acquired jurisdiction. The order states that a warden or other state or local officer who persists in attempting to

enforce those laws within the limits of such a reservation after having been ordered to desist therefrom, should be removed from the reservation.
