## BILKED OUT OF OPTION MONEY.

New York, June 15.—A sad experience with city sharpers has come into the life of Charles M. Brower, a truck farmer, hailing from Hickory, N. C. Just now he is at a loss as to how to get back home, having been relieved of all his funds.

Some weeks ago Brower received a letter offering him a farm in New Jersey, near this city. The price was small and he sent on \$25 to bind the bargain. Donning his best clothes he then set out for New York to inspect the farm. In his wallet were five \$10 bills. Upon arriving Brower met the real estate agent and visited the New Jersey farm with him. The land was nothing but a swamp and in a rage the old man demanded that his \$25 be returned. The real estate agent laughed at him, but Brower had heard of Dist. Atty. Jerome, and to him he went. An investigation was made, with the result that a warrant was issued for the real estate dealer.

The old farmer was waiting about the criminal courts building to see his prize when he began to cogitate over the expense of living in New York and unkindly of the passing pedestrians sat down upon the stairs to figure up what he had spent and count his money. There was still a balance of \$40 in the wallet.

"How did I spend that \$40?" he asked himself, and placing the wallet beside him he began to figure up what had become of the money. A thief saw the wallet, a skillful thief sent it down the steps with out the old man noticing it, and soon the wallet and thief were far away.

"Get to be careful with the rest," said Brower as he reached for the wallet. Then he saw the thief's hand, and his shouts attracted everyone in the court-house but to no purpose. Detectives were called, but they have no hope of recovering Brower's savings.

## TOM FIELDS CONFESSES MURDER OF FRED FIELDS

## ANOTHER BATTLE PROBABLE BEFORE PEACE IS DECLARED

London, June 17.—The practical certainty now that the peace negotiations can not begin for another month leads to the conviction that another battle will be fought in the interval.

According to the Daily Telegraph's Tientsin correspondent, a Japanese forward movement has already commenced, in spite of the rainy season. The Daily Telegraph's Tokyo correspondent gives an interesting idea of the situation from a correspondent who is said to be in a good position to know the actual facts. This correspondent says that the principal Russian depot is at Gushu Pass, where many light railways are being constructed northward to facilitate retreat. Lieut. Gen. Linovitch, bewildered by the strategy of the Japanese, is making repeated reconnaissance and throwing out inflammatory scouts. Nevertheless, at the present moment the correspondent says, all his army is completely enveloped. The Japanese army has made a circle a hundred miles in circumference round Linovitch and has gradually shut him in.

The Japanese military correspondent of the Morning Post says the Russian evacuation of Omsk shows that Gen. Kaxanurov's "Army of the Yalu" despite the difficulties met over a mountainous country, has arrived in time to synchronize with the movements of the Japanese armies and the correspondent adds, stirring events are imminent.

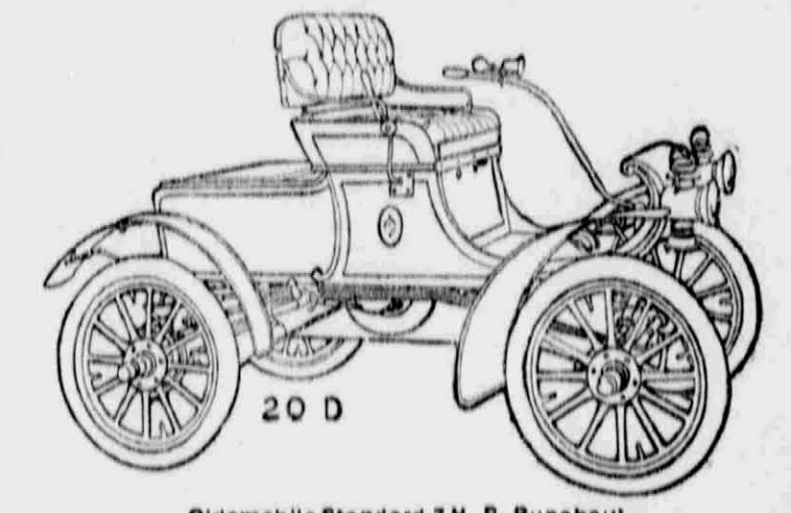
