Address of Judge J. G. Sutherland, of the District Court, Salt Lake City, August, 1876.

They are murderers, on their own statements, for they say on oath that they took part in that butchery. They do not say who else did, except by vague implication.

A supposition that Lee made, or contributed to the making, of a bona fide arrangement to save the lives of the children, by that capitulation, is a supposition in favor of innocence, which is a reasonable supposition in this case, because the proof does not overtake it, and it is supported by collateral facts of great evidentiary force.
