Pocatello, Idaho, July 28.—Last Wednesday evening William E. Trapp, of this place, the proprietor of several saloons, including the rock saloon at Blackfoot, became involved in a shoot-ing scrape at the latter place, which ended in the killing of John Callins, a railroad grade contractor, in self-de fense. Callins was unruly and was ordered by the bartender, Ed. Johnson, to keep quilet, and upon trying to oust him from the resort, Callins stabbed the latter with a knife once in the liver and once in the groin, inflicting serious injuries. Johnson called for help, and Trapp came in from the outside in re-sponse and Callins started to leave, when Trapp called on him to remain till the officers could be summoned.
