WYOMING RANGES. Sheepmen Are Jubilant Over the Good

Grazing Prospects. Late reports from stock ranges of Wyoming are very encouraging. In all parts of the state there seems to be an abundant supply of grass, late rains having placed the range in prime con-dition for winter feeding. Cattlemen say the ranges are in bet-ter shape at the present time than ever before and are taking advantage of the conditions

the conditions, Sheepmen are jubilant over the outlook, for instead of being compelled to ship their sheep to market on account of a shortage of range feed, as in for-mer years, they can hold on and feel

safe during the winter. The pientiful supply of range feed,

and the fact that larger quantities of hay were harvested this year than ever before has resulted in fewer lambs being sold to Colorado feeders. Last year almost every flock master in the southern part of the state sold off his lambs to the feeders but this fall they feel that they have enough hay, both alfalfa and native, to fatter what lambs they wish to ship and also keep that had avera in artime condition
