To Tell the Age of Eggs.

We recommend the following process (which has been known for some time, but has been forgotten) for finding out the age of eggs and distinguishing those that are fresh from those that are not. This method is based upon the decrease in the density of eggs as they frow old. Dissolve two ounces of kitchen salt in a pint of water. When a fresh-laid egg is placed in this solution it will descend to the bottom of the vessel, while one that has been laid on the day previous will not quite reach the

previous will not quite reach th

If the egg be three days old it will swim in the liquid, and if it is more than three days old it will float on the surface, and project above the latter more and more in proportion as it is o'der.—La Nature.

THE HELL GATE LIGHT TO BE STOPPED.—Acting Secretary Fairchild has given orders for the extinguish-ment of the electric light in the tower at Hell Gate, New York harbor, from and after December 1. This ac-tion was based on the recommenda-tion of the Lighthouse Board, and be-cause of constant complaints from mariners that the dazzling character of the light made it a detriment, instead of an aid, to navigation.
