Big Horn Sugar Factory-Senator Smoot of Utah, and Senator W. A. BREAKS OUT OF JAIL.

Cunning Shakes His Irons and Does

Stant for the Police.

Rydalch, the Provo man who some years ago invented the jall-breaking act and went into vaudeville under the stage name of Cunning, gave a select audience of police officers, county commissioners, newspaper men and theatrical folk a few thrills over at police headquarters yesterday afternoon

Cunning opened the ball by assert-ing that he could get out of the new jail, with the latest things in bars and locks, in a few minutes. Subsequently he made good his challenge in short order, much to the mystification of the officers. By way of hampering him in his movements Manager Jennings the Orpheum asked Acting Chief of Police Burbidge to bring out the latest he had in handcuffs, shackles, etc., and chain Cunning down.

Two 25-lb. Oregon boots were brought into service and placed around each ankle and then they were locked se-curely to each leg with a patent screw key which was handed over to the custody of a newspaper man. Then Cunning's legs were shackled and a pair of handcuffs were placed around his wrists by Captain Burbidge. A second pair of handcuffs were placed on his wrists by Patrolman George Harris who asserted that they were latest thing in bracelets and he had only secured them from the east a few weeks ago. The cuffs were locked with

combination lock after having been snapped on.
It look Cunning about five minutes to make his way from the chief's office to one of the new steel cages of the city prison. The prisoners peering through the gratings en route exhib-Ited some excitement over the spectacle of the heavily iround man being es-

corted by the officers and crowd Cunning was placed in one of the rells and the door locked with a patent lever device which cannot be manipulated from inside the cell. He was

then left alone while all retired and took up positions in the hall behind the tecond locked door.

Exactly 11 minutes and 15 seconds ater a knock was heard on the door. 
