OUTING OF OLD FOLKS AT LAGOON

S. S. EXCURSION TO SALT LAKE.

A. N. Terry Held for Mayhem—Burial Of J. E. Telfer—Schaeffer Convicted.

Ogden, July 10.—The "old folks committee" of the Weber stake are arranging for the annual outing of the old folks of Weber county to the Lagoon this year, to be held July 21. The ward committees are busy hunting up the old people and furnishing them with ribbons, different colors for different ages, and these will be worn on that day by the old folks and guarantees that anything they wish for will be theirs on the big day. All over 70 years of age will be the guests of the occasion.

S. S. OUTING TO SALT LAKE.
The Sunday schools and Mutual Improvement associations of Weber county will hold their annual outing at Salt Lake on July 14, for which extensive arrangements are being made. The day will be the "Weber County day" at the lake and it is expected that about 2,000 will go from here and the adjoining towns of the county.

HELD FOR MAYHEM.
After one of the harshest fought preliminary hearings in the annals of the police court before Judge Murphy in a number of years, A. N. Terry, charged with mayhem, has been bound over to the district court under a bond of \$500. Every bit of testimony that was submitted by both prosecution and defense was bitterly fought. The defense had many witnesses in young men who claimed that they were present the time the trouble arose and in which John Cullen had his left ear bitten off by A. N. Terry. From the testimony it appears that Cullen was trying to stop a fight between Terry's brother and another man when A. N. Terry jumped on Cullen from the rear and sunk his teeth into Cullen's right ear, severing it as clean as though it had been done with a knife.

BURIAL OF J. E. TELFER.
E. B. Telfer, who is in the city for the purpose of attending the funeral of his brother, J. E. Telfer, who died suddenly in the Healy House last week, and which was held yesterday from the Lindquist undertaking parlors. After the brother from Calgary, Canada, had taken one last look upon the face of his dead brother, the casket was sealed, a short sermon was pronounced by Rev. John E. Garver and the cortege moved to the Mountain View cemetery, where the interment took place.

He said that a wasted constitution and a weak heart probably brought the fatal stroke, whisky and tobacco having a great deal to do with it.

Waterloo, Ia., July 10.—Judge Charles A. Bishop of the Iowa supreme court last night dropped dead in the lobby of a hotel here. He was attending the meeting of the State Bar association, and seemed in the best of spirits. Just before he was stricken he remarked about his good health. A moment later he pitched forward dead.
Physicians said a clot of blood on the brain caused paralysis of the nerves controlling respiration. Judge Bishop was 53 years old.
