Chicago is Up in Arms Against Action Desired by River Points.

Commercial interests in Chicago, in the opinion of the New York Commercial, are very much opposed to jobbers

The Chleago men con-tend that if such a readjustment is ef-fected upon the basis sought the com-mercial supremacy of Chleago will be materially impaired and it will be nec-essary for them to invade the territory of Missouri river jobbers in self-de-fense. One firm, in fact, has fell it nec-essary alreday to do this by establishessary alreday to do this by establish-ing a great warhouse on the Missouri river.
