Then Burns feinied and quick-ly put a short, sharp right to the jaw, and Roche went down. He was badly dazed, and although he struggled to re-gain his feet, he was unable to do so before the fatal ten was counted. Immediately after the count Roche got to his feet, but staggered about the stage. WkAn he had recovered himself he went over smillngly to congratulate the winner. He had met a better man. The fight tonight was for a purse of \$1,500, which was put up by a syndicate of which Elehard Crocker, the former Tammany leader, was a member, and a \$1,600 on himself at odds of 3 to 1. The ringside betting was 7 to 2 on the Ameri-can. preparations for the fight. On the 'stroke of the gong Burns jumped to the center of the ring, which was an eighteen-foot affair, and started his usual tactics of trying to draw out his opponent. at the Theater Royal, for the world's

heavyweight championship. Practically only one blow was struck, Burns knock-

ing Roche out when hardly more than a

minute of the first round had been completed, by a short hock to the jaw, So

quickly did the end come that the great

nght was hever in doubt as to the main result. Burns stated that he was willing to give Roche another chance if sufficient inducements were forthcoming. He is now considering an offer provisionally made with the Dublin syndicate for a match with Bill Squires under the same terms as that with Roche. The scene in the theater was a remark-ble one. able one.

SIMPLY OUTCLASSED.

SIMPLY OUTCLASSED. There were seats for 4,000, and every one was occupied. It was a most en-thusiastic crowd and Roche received a great reception when he entered smiling and with confident air. The orchestra struck up "The Boys of Wexford." the spectators joining in the chorus. Burny bouts, strolled casually to the ring to the air of "The Star Spangled Banner." He was also well received, but the re-ception of the fighters was insignificant crompared with that given to Richard Croker, when the mast of ceremonies announced that it was largely through the efforts of the former Tammany lead-er that Roche was able to enter the con-test. Mr. Croker, who was tha a box at the ringside, had to acknowledge the tre-mendous cheering that greeted him. The two heavyweights came to the ring in their street clothes, and a quar-ter of an hour was occupied in making
