## LOCAL BRIEFS.

Lecture at Lehi—Prof. W. M. Stewart of the state normal school will lecture at Lehi, next Sunday night. The school is preparing for an elaborate exhibit at the Davis county fair.

Committed to Hospital—George M. Higgins was examined as to his sanity yesterday afternoon by County Physician Whitney and was committed to the State Mental hospital at Provo by Judge Armstrong.

Discovered Thistle—Prof. J. H. Paul of the university has discovered the Australian thistle on the campus, which it is eradicating. The department of agriculture is calling for its destruction wherever found.

Yom Kippur—The Hebrews will observe Yom Kippur, or the feast of the atonement, beginning at 6 p. m., to-day, and continuing for 24 hours. Rabbi Freund will conduct the services for the Reform congregation, and Rabbi Z. Bloksky for the Orthodox congregation. This is the year 5667 in the Jewish calendar.

Sent to Ogden—John Powell has been committed to the State Industrial school at Ogden by the juvenile court. The boy was out on probation, having violated the terms of his probation and hence was taken in charge, and committed to the industrial school. He was originally charged with stealing some shoes from the Robinson shoe company.

New Salt Company—The Clear Lake Salt company of this city has filed its articles of incorporation in the county clerk's office. Its capital stock is \$100,000, divided into shares of the par value of \$1 each. J. E. Ray is president; W. J. Robinson, vice president; and secretary; L. A. Ray, treasurer. The company will engage in the manufacture of salt and its by-products.

Infantry Coming—The first installment of the Twenty-fifth infantry will arrive here Oct. 2, in Companies E, F, H, I, K, L, M, which participated in the military display at Colorado Springs in celebration of the Pike's Peak anniversary. Companies A, B, C and D, the first battalion now stationed at Fort Logan, Colo., will be here Nov. 1, on being relieved by the Twenty-first infantry from the Philippines.

Oratorical Contest—The W. C. T. U. gold medal oratorical contest will take place in the Westminster Presbyterian church this evening. Six girls who are winners of the silver medals will contest for this prize. They are Sadie Jurensen, Westminster church; Lily King, Phillips Congregational; Ruby Lang, First Presbyterian; Alberta McCanne, Central Christian; Norma Martin and Gladys Robinson of Emerson ward.

Will Not Effect Coffee—Local coffee dealers report that the Cuban situation will not have any appreciable effect on the American trade, as tobacco, rather than coffee is the great crop of the island. But there is expected an advance in prices because of the proposal of the Brazilian government to take control of the coffee output of the country. At the world's fair, Chicago, 1893, the Brazilian growers displayed 1,600 varieties of coffee in their government building.
