DATE SET FOR BRIDWELL CASE Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds to be Investigated by Board.

GRANITE CONTROVERSY ENDS. Payment of \$6,250 in Settlement of Claim of \$8,100 is Ordered at Last Night's Meeting.

Charges against George M. Bridwell, superintendent of buildings and grounds, will be investigated by the board of education Tuesday evening.

The committee appointed to meet with a committee from the Granite school board to settle the controversy in regard to the Waterloo school building which was taken over by the city, reported to the board. It was agreed to give the Granite school board \$4,250. The original claim of the Granite board was \$8,100. The report of the committee was adopted.

During yesterday he called on quite a number of lawyers in solicitation of their support for the proposed Prison Reform league and found most of them favoring it. The most notable feature in the prospectus of the league is the proposed abolition of capital punishment.
