Armory hall was packed with people at the close of the parade to hear the address of Mr. Talbot, who was introduced by Judge Armstrong. The speaker's theme was the historical development of the social, industrial and commercial life of this country. He held that the 1-refecting of the government was responsible for the early dement was responsible for the early dement was responsible for the early development of the fraternal instinct in the people, and traced the growth of the fraternal spirit throughout history, the people, and traced the growth of the fraternal spirit throughout history, showing that all fraternal organizations were not mush-room growths, but the process of evolution. The last 25 years has brought the co-operative system of the fraternal organizations to the crystalized form of the present day, and this is being perfected as time goes on. The order has now 1,200,000 members in the United States.
