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ALL IS READY FOR THE OPENING DAY

Balance of Turf Officials Arrive—Field of Eight Starters in Cullen Handicap.

The hotel corridors last night presented scenes undeniably indicative of the near approach of the opening of the big race meeting at the fair grounds, which is scheduled for Saturday afternoon. The arrivals from Los Angeles, San Francisco, Ogden and from every direction were greater than for any previous day since the racing host began to show up in Salt Lake City, and they looked into the corridors of the leading hotels to greet their friends and talk of the prospects of the season and a successful season of good sport.

Prominent among the arrivals were Fred Morlock, who will have charge of the grandstand boys; Jim Dunn, one of the oldest pool sellers in the country; Ed Soule and Richard Mandel, both extensive operators in the big rings on the coast and metropolitan tracks; and F. E. Eassey, who is in charge of the ring. Probably a hundred others more or less prominent in the turf world were included in the list of arrivals. "Commence" Dick Dwyer, the peer of all present day starters, will arrive with his family from San Francisco and then the official family of the association will be in the ground.
