### Our Country Contemporaries.

Ogden Junction, June 15—

We briefly stated in our issue of

yesterday that a serious affray oc-

curred in the neighborhood of this

city last Sunday evening. As the

probabilities are that their might

no legal investigation for some

days in consequence of the danger-

ous character of the reports of one

of the parties, we give the particu-

lars as reported to us. On Sunday

evening, Thomas A. Furnis was

returning alone from the residence

of Mr. Bues just south of this city,

and while passing a gateway at

Italian, by the name of Michael

Bues, suddenly sprang from a

thicket and struck him a violent

blow on the breast with a club.

Mr. Furnis defended himself as

well as he could, and the Italian

called for help, whereupon James

Bues, who appears to have been

lying in ambush, rushed from the

fence and struck Furnis a severe

blow on the side of his head. As

soon as possible after receiving

from the effects of the blow, Furnis

finding he had two to deal with,

he was suddenly pushed by his

assailants. Fearing they might

overtake him, and being determin-

ed to sell his life as dearly as pos-

sible, he opened a small pocket

knife as he ran, and reached a

water ditch directly in his path.

Bertoni overlooked and struck him

again with a club, upon which

Furnis closed his eyes, and

stabbed him in the neck.

The other assailant coming up

and seeing the blood streaming from

Bertoni's forehead, Furnis, with

his hand to his eye, while he as-

sisted the wounded man. While

the affray was going on nothing

was said by the assaulting parties,

no reason was given for the violence

perpetrated. The supposition is

that the whole affair grew out of

the fact that Furnis had been pay-

ing his address to Miss Mary

Bues, and had just escorted her

home. The Italian has worked for

the Bues family for some years, and

it is supposed that a portion of the

family were opposed to Mr. Furnis's

attention to Miss Bues.

Furnis has a gash on his head one

and a half inches long, lying his

skull bare, and is very much bruised

on his breast, arms and back. Ber-

toni has a cut on his left arm four

inches long, a cut on the right

cheek; his nose is almost severed

and he has a very dangerous wound

in his neck three and a half inches

long, within a half inch of the

jugular vein.

Dr. P. L. Anderson was called in

to dress his wounds, and it took

eleven stitches to properly secure

them.
