DEPEW ON THE PHILIPPINES

New York Senator Makes a Speech in the Senate Today.

Upholds the Retention of the Islands -Form of Government Endorsed by President Jefferson.

Washington, Feb. 27 .- Previous announcement that Mr. Depew (N. Y.) would address the Senate today drew a large attendance of senators and a notable assemblage of spectators in the

galleries. Mr. Turley (Tenn.) was entitled to the floor at the conclusion of routine business to conclude his speech on the Quay case, but he yielded to Mr. Depew, say-ing that if the time allowed he would finish his speech after the New York senator had concluded, if not he would

go on tomorrow. Mr. Depew addressed himself to the resolutions offered on the Philippine uestion, particularly to that proposed by Mr. Beveridge (Ind.) declaratory of policy of the United States toward a policy of the the Philippines.

Mr. Depew declared that most of the questions regarding the American oc-cupacy of the Philippines, which are now being discussed, are purely aca-demic. Said he: "We are in the Philippines; we are

there to stay by conquest and by treaty rights. All which precedes the ratification of the treaty by the Senate of the United States is an academic ques-No one denied, he said, that the na-

Water pipes all frozen and citizens fighting fire with snow. At 4 o'clock this morning the fire was

still raging, and not under control. Snow was being piled up in huge piles and teams were used to cart it to the scene of the fire. Huge honfires were lit at all fire plugs, but at late reports the water had not thawed out. The nearest town is Edenburg, ten miles away, and there is no possibility

of getting help here.

Lombard's Failure.

New York, Feb. 27 .- William A. Lombard, of this city, has filed a petition in bankruptcy. Liabilities, \$55,058; no assets. The liabilities are principally for borrowed money on notes and as a stockholder of the Union National bank, of Denver, Bloomfield State bank, of Bloomfield, Neb., and the Baker City, Oregon, National bank.

Agree on Puerto Rican Bill.

Washington, Feb. 26 .- At the conference of House Republicans tonight on the Puerto Rican tariff bill, assurances were given that the President believed the measure constitutional and would approve it if it came to him, and an agreement was reached to limit the operation of the bill to two years, and to reduce the duty imposed by it from 25 to 15 per cent of the American tariff.

As a result the Republican leaders claim that the bill will have the sup-port of all the Republican leaders ex-cept four-Messrs. McCall of Massachu-setts, Littlefield of Maine, Lorimer of Illinois and Crumpacker of Indiana, and that this loss will be offset by affirmative votes of the opposition. They claim the passage of the modified bill is cer-tain. FIVE STEWARDESSES DROWNED.

Swedish Mail Steamer Stranded-

Retirement of the L. A. W. from International Association.

Paris, Feb. 26 .- The congress of the International Cyclists' association concluded its deliberations today after several stormy sessions. The question of the retirement of the League of Am-erican Wheelmen from the association and the admission of the National Cy cling association in its place furnished the subject for warm discussions. The session was secret, but it transpires that President Blaurock of the National Cycling association was heard in sup-port of the request to enter the International Cycling association as a body for the government of amateur and professional racing. The fact that Mr. Ocker, the dele-

gate of the League of American Wheelmen, was allowed to be present at the discussions and to vote, although the League of American Wheelmen re-signed its membership, provoked pro-tests from the partisans of the National Cycling association, especially as the congress decided not to admit the lat-ter until official notice had been re-ceived that the League of Amerncan Wheelmen had withdrawn from the as-sociation. A cablegram of inquiry was subsequently sent to the League of Am-erican Wheelmen, which replied confirming its withdrawal. A British delegate and the secretary

of the congress, Sturmeyer, then moved that the League of American Wheel-men, although no longer governing American racing, should remain affili-ated to the International Cyclists association and that American racing men be placed in the same category as Germans. The motions were rejected and the congress voted the admission of the National Cyming association as the successor to the League of Amer-ican Wheelmen ican Wheelmen.

As a consequence of the definite set-tlement of the American conflict the congress granted full amnesty to all racing men who had been penalized by either rival association.
