EASTERN.

The Strike Continues.

DAYTON, Ohio, 2.—The strike
continues on the C. H. & D. and
D. M. roads; but is still confined to
brakemen and firemen, who refuse
to return to work except on the
former basis. One freight came to
the city this evening from Cin-
cinnati and another returned. It is
expected that arrangements will be
made between the employees and the
company to-morrow.

Hanged to a Tree.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., 2.—A Courier-
Journal special from North Vernon,
Ind., contains the following: John
Timon was taken from the city jail
at 2 o'clock this morning by a
masked band of men, and hanged to
a tree until nearly dead. Each
man then lashed him terribly; be-
ing then liberated, and asked to
divulge concerning the robbery, he
declared his innocence until the
last.

GREAT BRITAIN.

Eastern War News.

LONDON, 2.—Oman Pasha tele-
graphs from Plevna on Friday, as
follows: We have made offensive
movements in force against the
Russian fortified position at Pil-
chad (probably Pishah) on the
maps), five miles east of Plevna,
and encountered the enemy half a
march from Pishad. After two
hours' desperate fighting, the en-
emy fled. We carried three redoubts
by assault, captured a gun, and
many horses and arms. The Rus-
sians, who numbered 30,000, lost
heavily. Our loss was slight.A Russian official dispatch, dated
Gorny Studen, Saturday, says:
All is quiet towards Rostchuk, O-
man Pasha, Lofcha, and the Bal-
kan passes.In the fighting before
Plevna on August 31, from 8 in the
morning until 4 in the afternoon,
the Turks numbered 25,000, and
were repulsed along the whole line.
The Russian loss was 500.The Russian government has
sent to its ambassadors abroad a
dispatch saying, that beside the
several cases of Turkish barbarities
already published the troop, on oc-
cupying the batteries in the Shipka
Pass, found there heaps of heads
belonging to the Russian soldiers,
whose mutilated bodies were dis-
covered in the neighborhood.Correspondents with the Russian
army say, that during the struggle
in the Shipka Pass not one wound-
ed Russian, in the place
temporarily occupied by the Tur-
kish troops, was found. At evening
from twenty to thirty of these un-
fortunate men had been decapitated,
and several of their bodies were
found with their feet, hands, eyes,
nose, and other parts cut off, and
their breasts slashed by yatagans.
The heads had been carried into
the Turkish lines where they were
found by the Russian troops after
the occupation of the works.A correspondent with the Turks
at Shipka Pass telegraphs that a
large reinforcement of several
mortars had arrived, and decisive
action against the Russian position
will be undertaken shortly. An-
other telegram states that the
Russians have just been reinforced.
