

MURRAY TAKES GIANT STRIDES.

Smelter Town to the South to Become a City of the Second Class.

PROCLAMATION IS NOW READY.

Important Event Will be Celebrated On the Fourth With a Splendid Program.

The 1st of July will begin a month of great significance to the city of Murray which now takes its place along side of Ogden, Logan and Provo as one of the substantial cities of the state, and loses its swaddling clothes of suburb and village era. The legal steps which have been in process for the past few weeks, looking to a proclamation from Governor Cutler declaring Murray to be a city of the second class, are completed. The attorney general has examined them minutely and has passed his approval upon them all. Yesterday the document declaring the new era for Murray was prepared and presented to the governor for his signature. This afternoon, or more probably tomorrow, it will be issued, and then Murray will come into its own, and prepare to celebrate.

The event coming to the Fourth of July has made a special place in the valley town that simply demands the biggest Fourth of July celebration ever held, and that kind of a celebration is just what is to come, according to the indications set forth by the committees in charge, and a large handful which is about to be scattered broadcast.

The program consists of two parts, a formal celebration in the morning preceding an afternoon given over to dancing, sports, and a baseball game between the Murray team and the Woods Cross team.

LONG PARADE IN MORNING.
For the morning parade, Michael Maize will be marshal of the day, as well as of the city. The parade, which will consist of many floats, two bands, and numerous other features, will start at 10 o'clock in the morning at State street and Little Cottonwood bridge, and will march north on State street to Sixteenth north street, countermarching on Fifth street to Murray street, commonly known as Seventeenth south street, then west to the O. & L. depot, countermarching on Murray street to Vine street and east to the city limits. The parade will break up at Freeze grove, where a splendid program will be rendered.

ORATION AT FREEZE GROVE.
The Freeze grove celebration will be opened by a selection from the band, followed by the invocation by Rev. Samuel Atkinson, and a quiet dinner by Mrs. Chas. Caldwell, J. A. Warburton, Fred Davis and A. P. Johnson.

The oration will be delivered by Frank Holman, and will be followed by three musical numbers which will conclude the program. They are, a solo, "The Star Spangled Banner," by Mrs. J. H. Hutton, with accompaniment; a mandolin and guitar selection by Prof. Hansen and others, and a closing selection, "America," by the band.

In the grove where the grand stand is placed, a large number of tables are also located, and on these, after the formal program, the visitors to Murray may open their lunch baskets and settle down for a hearty good time. The place is an ideal one for picnicking and general gatherings, and for the occasion is to be thoroughly overhauled and decorated.

AFTERNOON OF SPORTS.
The program arranged for the afternoon is extensive and complete, and embraces almost every kind of sport that could be listed. There are prizes, for all, too, even for the man with the biggest nose, and the man with the homeliest face, and also for the fastest woman, and the boy who can catch the greased pig. At the dance hall a free dance will be given to children, and in the afternoon, and an evening dance is scheduled for the men and women.

The running track has been selected, to consist of a rough track, and a long one on one side of the grove. It will be roped off, and every chance given the married men, the boys, and the old and young of all kinds, to have a good time. Prizes worth \$100 are given winners in these events.

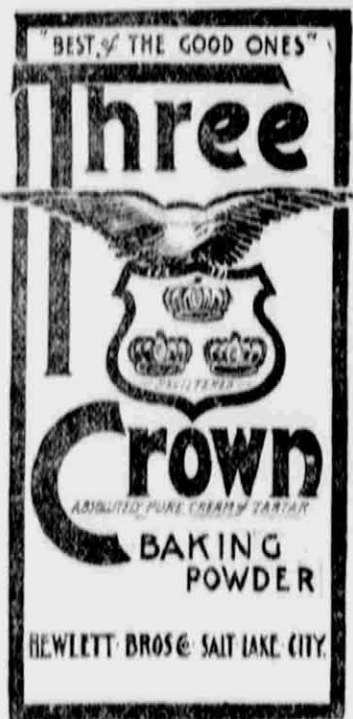
MANY CASH PRIZES.

FAVORS THE BOULEVARD.

Henry W. Naisbitt Makes Some Suggestions as to Proposed Route.

Among those greatly interested in the proposed Salt Lake boulevard, is Henry W. Naisbitt, who has been an advocate of such a scheme for many years. Mr. Naisbitt, however, is not in favor of the proposed route, as he believes it could be greatly enhanced if taken through the Eagle state on to the north bench, bringing the intervening ravine and so extending the drive, as to bring it in the vicinity of the 10th street, then south on Second West street, past the Warm Spring and St. Mark's hospital. The gentleman's attention to the fact that this would make a fitting approach to Capitol hill, where some day a state building will be erected, and a would take in a strip of property that even now is quite attractive. Mr. Naisbitt also advocates a drive along the east foothills as far south as Mill Creek, or Cottonwood, returning via Liberty park or the east drive. SCHETTLE SAYS HE IS NOT GUILTY

Former Salt Lake Banker Appears in Court and Enters His Own Plea.

DOUGLAS PLEA IS WITHDRAWN

Woman Who Shot at Mrs. Lottie Martin Is Given Leave to Demand To the Information.

Five defendants were up before Judge Ritchie in the district court today to enter their plea to various informations against them. Former Banker D. Schettler entered plea of not guilty to both informations against him charging him with receiving money for deposit when he knew that his bank was insolvent. He appeared in person and was not accompanied by an attorney.

Mrs. M. L. Douglas was arraigned upon the charge of assault with a deadly weapon with intent to commit murder and pleaded not guilty. The woman broke down in court and sobbed bitterly, and thought she would collapse before her arraignment was concluded, but she succeeded in holding up until after the ordeal. James Hebert, her attorney, was allowed to withdraw the plea and demand to the information if he so desired at a later period. On Dec. 12, 1904, Mrs. Douglas shot and wounded Mrs. Lottie Martin at the latter's house in this city. It is said that jealousy over the actions of Mr. Douglas towards Mrs. Martin was the cause of the shooting.

OTHER ARRAIGNMENTS.

Thomas Laughney waived the reading of the three informations against him charging him with receiving money for deposit when he knew that his bank was insolvent. He pleaded not guilty to the same. He is alleged to have burglarized a store at Third West and Fourteenth South streets, and to have stolen a large amount of money and jewelry. He is charged with the charge of adultery. The crime is alleged to have been committed on June 5, 1903.

Perry and was born at London, England, May 19, 1847. She emigrated to Utah in the year 1870, and has since been a resident of this city. About two years ago her oldest son was killed through falling down the elevator shaft in the McMillan block. The blow was severe and she was ever since ailing. She was a member of the Fifth ward choir. She leaves a husband and two children.
