**ON TEMPERANCE.**

The National Temperance Congress and the LI or Traffic Question.

THE MAINE REPUBLICANS MEET TOGETHER.

Missouri Democratic State Convention.—Society of Christian Endeavor.

By Telegram to the NEWS: TEMPERANCE.

The National Temperance Congress in Session at New York.

New York, June 12.—The National Temperance Congress this morning discussed the liquor traffic. It should be a political party whose dominant idea is prohibition of the liquor traffic? Rev. Dr. Carroll, editor of the Independent, took the ground that such a party was not needed. Prohibition is a question that does not come within the scope of Congress except in a very limited degree. A national party, to live, must have a dominant national issue, and prohibition is not such an issue. We would have more prohibition if we had fewer prohibition parties.

Rev. Dr. Bacon, late president of the Wisconsin University, said the prohibition party is now under a most unfortunate disability. It cannot be trusted to secure prohibition. Hence the necessity of a prohibition party.

Mr. Hilliard of Boston spoke in opposition to a prohibition party. He thought this was to be a congress or a conference, but it seemed to be only a caucus.

AT THE AFTERNOON SESSION the principal topic discussed was "To what causes is to be attributed the failure of the prohibition amendment in the late convocation in Massachusetts, Pennsylvania and Rhode Island?"

H. H. Faxon of Massachusetts declared the defeat of the State to be the fact that a high license law had been placed on the statutes a short time before the campaign, and Boston was defeated by the vote of 5,000 votes. He thought local option the best thing. The prohibition party, he said, is exerting a healthy and restraining influence on the republican party. As for the democratic party, it cannot be trusted to do anything which will advance temperance or morality.

The attitude of labor unions toward the liquor traffic was also discussed.

President Gumpers of the American Federation of Labor said that as a rule the laboring men were indifferent to the temperance and prohibition movement. Underlying laborers, unable to procure proper nourishment, sought relief in liquor and took upon any attempt to deprive them of it as a movement to secure for the rich privileges they could not enjoy.

L. S. Wakeman said the prohibitionist must descend from his pedestal of holiness, study the working man, plan his work on a level, and change his mode of procedure.

**Maine Republicans.**  
Augusta, Me., June 12.—The Republican State Convention met today. Governor Hurlbut was re-nominated by acclamation. A recess was taken, pending a report on resolutions.

The Third District Republican Convention nominated Seth J. Milliken of Belfast for Congress.

The platform was unanimously adopted at the afternoon session. It unreservedly renewed the subscription of the republican party of Maine to the principle of prohibition of the liquor traffic in the United States.

The enactment of such legislation as shall enable each State to exercise its right to regulate the traffic in liquor, without regard to the principle of prohibition, is favored in original packages or otherwise, favors the policy of prohibition. Liberal petitions, free ballot and free count, all measures for the national defense and a revival of American commerce, regulation of immigration, to prevent the introduction of pauper labor, and criminal classes, unreservedly commends the administration of President Harrison, and pledges to it, and to the faithful support; recognizes the magnificent content made by the republicans in the House of Representatives for rights of the country, under the leadership of Speaker Reed, who has by his vigorous discharge of his duty, done honor to this State and great public service to the country.

**MISSOURI DEMOCRATS.**  
St. Louis, Mo., June 12.—The democratic State convention was called to order this morning and resumed building for supreme judges. The sixteenth ballot resulted: J. Morgan, 50; McFarland, 37; Thomas, 17; Smith, 25; Nicholson, 10.

This afternoon balloting was continued for State superintendent of public instruction, and for the office of State auditor. A recess was taken until tonight. The convention holds the committee on resolutions report a platform.

It condemns the present system of tariff taxation and monopolies; argues the necessity of the administration for violation of the tariff laws; and the free coinage of silver, the forfeiture of unimproved land, and the enactment of laws to insure honest elections.

**Society of Christian Endeavor.**  
St. Louis, June 12.—The Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor began their convention here today with 4,000 delegates present, and more coming. Governor Francis made a brief speech of welcome.

At the evening session Rev. F. E. Clark delivered a long address on the subject of "The modern uprising and its significance." The central idea of the address was that the modern uprising is the Christian Endeavor movement, which is a revival of the movement.

**Sessional Exaggerations.**  
HELENA, Mont., June 12.—The report of threatened Indian hostilities in Eastern Montana largely sensational. An account received here implicated the Cheyennes in depredations on cattle herds. The only murderous crime committed was the killing of Homer T. Ferguson, foreman of the Bannock cattle company, on May 21.

The guilty Indians were surrendered and jailed, awaiting trial at Miles City, and the recent movement of the band of Cheyennes led to a suspicion that they were making ready to go on the war path.

The military took prompt measures to check the outbreak, if mediated. The exaggerated rumors secured a number of expert soldiers, and in response to representations of the Governor dispatched to Miles City some arms and ammunition.

Governor Toole said this afternoon that he had an officer at Miles City who didn't seem to share in the base of trouble there. The soldiers were enough to cope with any Indians meditating mischief in that county. The opinion here is that the Cheyennes will be kept under control without bloodshed.

**World's Fair Meeting.**  
CHICAGO, June 12.—At the meeting of the World's Fair stockholders this afternoon 120 men were present who held proxies for nearly all the

stock of the absent thousands. The number of shares voted was 307,752. The proposition to double the capital stock, making the total \$10,000,000, included \$5,000,000 was unanimously adopted, as was also a change of the name from "World's Exposition of 1893" to "World's Columbian Exposition."

**MAGAZINE MANUSCRIPTS.**

THOUSANDS SUPPLIED WHERE ONLY A FEW HUNDRED ARE NEEDED.

From a "Topic of the Time," in The Century for June, we quote as follows: "During the past two years from 500 to 800 manuscripts were annually submitted to The Century Magazine for publication. This is an increase over previous years, and does not include the hundreds, perhaps thousands, of propositions submitted with regard to articles. As we have had an increase in the number of articles published in America of late years, and as the newspapers are publishing more contributions than ever by writers on the regular staff, it is evident that there has been an increase in literary activity at least in proportion to the increase in population."

"Now out of 900 manuscripts a year The Century can only possibly print 400 or less. It is therefore editing a magazine is not unlike walking into a garden of flowers and gathering a single bouquet. In other words, to select an article, a story, a poem, is not necessarily to reject it. There may be weeds in the garden—there may be weeds in the bouquet—but the fact that a particular flower is not gathered into the monthly bouquet does not prove that the editor regarded the blossom as a weed, and therefore passed it by. It would be impossible to sweep all the flowers into a single handful. There is a certain selection, but it is really impossible to give an sympathetic or apologetic word from editorial pen, or to present the above simile with considerable difference. There is truth in it, nevertheless! And it would probably be more correct for editors to make up a number of bouquets from the flowers at their disposal than to gather the single one of which alone they have none."
