

At ten o'clock November 8th the examination of witnesses for the defense was resumed.

H. S. Krigbaum testified—Have lived in this city over a year; am a real estate dealer; worked six weeks for the "Liberal" committee during the August campaign; filled out some of the objections against the South Cottonwood voters; did not know but that they were legal voters; was told they were not, and therefore objected to their right to vote; had no personal knowledge concerning the challenged parties; they might have been legal voters, but was informed they were not.

The ballots of poll one, Bingham Precinct, were produced in evidence by the defense, and upon being counted showed 30 votes for Ferguson and 99 for Allen.

At this juncture of the proceedings a tiresome wait for witnesses ensued.

E. V. R. Thompson testified—I was presiding judge of the second poll in the fifth precinct of this city; gave the box into the hands of Mr. Godfrey at the office of the Utah Commission, where it remained until November 1st, when I was ordered to deliver it to the clerk of the Third District Court.

Cross examined by Mr. Brown—Had the key in my possession for several weeks after the election; but subsequently gave it to Secretary Sells; don't know that the box had not been molested during the time that intervened between its delivery to the Utah Commission, and its delivery to Clerk McMillan. Opened it at the office of the Utah Commission the other day in the presence of Secretary Sells. Did so for the purpose of ascertaining if it really was my box; did not disturb the contents either by taking from or putting in other ballots. On the night of election I did not take the box to the "Liberal" headquarters or to the office of Judge Powers before delivering it at the Commissioners' office. Don't know that myself and Secretary Sells had any right to open the ballot box, but just did it to see if the box was the one in use at the poll where I was judge. Could have marked it so as to distinguish it from other ballot boxes but did not.

Another wait ensued during which Mr. Brown said:

Counsel for defense might wisely have saved some of his reproachful rhetoric to be used on his own witnesses, instead of having made such lavish use of it on us and ours at the outset of this investigation.

Judge Loofborough (harshly)—We did so simply for self-protection. We have been waiting for Col. Sells, our most important witness. He has been sent for a number of times but for some reason he has not put in appearance.

The Court (smiling)—Perhaps he has not received his fees.

Captain Greenman testified—I was presiding judge of election at the second poll of the Fourth precinct of this city for the August election; the ballot box was carefully locked and sealed at the close of the count on the evening of election and

was in my possession all the time till November 1st, when I delivered it to Clerk McMillan of the Third District Court.

The ballots and tally sheet were here produced and certified to by the witness, and were offered in evidence.
