McAleer was a very fast runner. He could do ten seconds and might have gone better had he trained for sprinting. His stride was very long, and when he was going at full speed he could eat distance by the yard. In running for a fly at the Polo Grounds he was going back and toward right field, full tilt. He had forgotten the slope of the ridge, and as he stepped from its crest he involuntarily adjusted his weight to meet the level surface, but, as it was, his foot struck the ground some inches below where he had calculated, and the result was similar to that of one who in descending stairs finds no step where he had expected one:

PACIFIC SQUADRONS ARE TO BE CONSOLIDATED.

Washington, March 13.-Complete plans for the consolidation into one plans for the consolidation into one fleet of all American cruising vessels in the Pacific ocean were made public today by the navy department. The order probably will go into effect about the end of this mouth when Rear Admiral Brownson will become commander-in-chief of all American naval vessels in the Pacific. Rear Admiral Swineburne will be commander of the second squadron and Rear Admiral J. H. Dayton will command the third squadron.

At present the warships in the Pacific are organized into the Asiatic fleet and the Pacific squadron. Their consolidation is in accordance with the navy department's policy instituted by the abolition of the South Atlantic and European stations in the Atlantic and the concentration of all vessels in that occan under one command.

In a statement from the navy department it is shown that the group of ships in the Pacific will remain in the same general position and perform much the same duties they have at present. They will, however, probably meet for general drills and exercises anywhere on the station and an effort will be made to repair all the larger ships in Pacific coast navy yards. As far as is practicable, docking and minor repairs to vessels in Aslatic waters will be made at Cavite or Olingano.

The department does not expect to send any of the battleships now in the Atlantic to the Pacific. The fire squadrot of the Pacific fleet will be made up of the following vessels:

First Division—West Virginia, Colorado, Maryland and Pennsylvania.

EIGHT HOUR LAW.

Secy. Taft Gives Orders to Engineer Officers to Enforce It.

Washington, March 13.—Secy, Taft has given orders to the engineer officers of the war department to enforce to the letter the eight hour law as applied to public works under their direction. This action, it is said, was taken by the secretary on his own account for the reason that the construction formerly given to the law, whereby large classes of employes were held to be exempt from its operation, was erroneous. The effect of this last order, which was issued with the permission of the president, will be farreaching and it is predicted will greatly reduce the amount of river and harbor work that can be accomplished under the appropriations made by the last Congress.
