A Fifty Horse Power Motor Ordered from the General Electric Co.

The remainder of the lumber for the new Fortune mill at the company's property at Bingham, was scheduled to have the Caboon yards at Murray to-day. Work on the mill will be pushed and it is expected that two weeks will see the building completed. Ethner Hill is visiting the property to-Elmer Hill is visiting the property to-day for the purpose of arranging some details regarding the new machinery which, it is thought, will be purchased by Mr. Hill in the East. Arrangements have practically been made with the General Eastre company through its agent here to furnish a 50-horse power, three phase, induction motor. This will be operated from the Jordan Narrows nower plant. The contract with the power can pany has not yet been signed, but negotiations are being carried on with thet object, and it is probable that all errangements for power will be

all arrangements for power will be completed during the next few days. The mill will have a capacity of 160 tons a day, and it is stated that, with the ore already blocked out in the mine and that which is now on the dump, mough ore is assured to run the mill for its full encacity for a year. It is the intention to have the mill working as soon after January 1st as possible,

Some of the ore which was assayed at the mine, showed over 4,000 ounces in silver to the ton, and the assayer stated that the specimens of horn silver sent in were richer than the samples assayed. A thick stratum of the muriate is seen projecting from each of the specimens and while nothing is said about the gold values, it is supposed they will run up quite well. As the ore is just coming in nothing can be said of the value of the strike.
