Hammer finally made a confession and said that he took from \$3 to \$10 each day, stealing small amounts at various times during the day. His scheme was to list an article cheaper than the price called for and then pocket the difference. After making his confession Hammer refused to talk about the case. He is a well appearing young man and so far as known has not been addicted to the gambling or drinking habits. Tunnel Providing Exit from Portland Will be 4,200 Feet Long.

It is announced from Seattle that the It is announced from Seattle that the proposed Harriman extension to Puget Sound will be started early this fail, the work to begin on the tunnel through the St. John peninsula. This tunnel, which provides the exit for the Puget sound extension from Portland, will be 4,200 feet in length. It begins at a point between Arbina and St. John, and after cutting through the extension it emerges south of Oregon slough on the Columbia river. Most of the work will be easy, for the tunnel pierces a gravel and soft clay formation. -
