

## BY TELEGRAPH. CONGRESSIONAL.

### SENATE.

Edmunds said he intended to call up the joint resolution adverse to the erasure of the names of battles from the flags and from the army register, but refrained as he understood that Senator Sumner was too unwell to speak.

A resolution was adopted, extending the time for receiving models for the Farragut statue thirty days.

Sherman called up the bill authorizing the exchange of registered coupon bonds.

WASHINGTON, 19.—Bayard offered an amendment which was agreed to, providing that the operation of the law shall not increase the public debt or rate of interest on bonds.

The bill was briefly discussed and laid over.

The Senate resumed consideration of the French spoliation bill.

Morton offered an amendment providing that no money appropriated by the act shall be paid to insurance companies, their representatives, or assignees, which received the war premiums upon risks for loss of which they were paid compensation, nor to any person representing claim in whole or in part paid by insurance companies, to the extent that such claims were paid by such companies.

Wright, of Iowa, offered a substitute for Morton's amendment, more restrictive upon claimants. Ordered printed.

### HOUSE.

WASHINGTON, 19.—Hooper reported from the investigating committee on charges against the Tenth National Bank of New York of its locking up currency with a view to producing a panic. The committee recommend the passage of a bill prohibiting national banks from locking up currency and that any officer of such banks abetting such action be fined \$10,000 with imprisonment for five years.

On motion Wood's resolution was adopted that the banking committee inquire whether unlawful combinations for locking up gold and money exist causing commercial financial stringency and report if legislation is necessary to prevent and punish such unlawful combination.

A resolution was adopted appointing a committee of three to examine the cause of the loss of stamps from the assistant treasurer's office at New York.

The bill paying the expenses of the Mexican commission passed.

The diplomatic appropriation bill appropriating \$1,332,000, reported and made the special order for Jan. 7th.

The House went into committee of the whole on the deficiency bill. After debate the bill was reported with amendment forbidding the board of public works of the District of Columbia from incurring indebtedness for the U. S. beyond the amounts appropriated by Congress. The bill passed, 109 against 45.

At one o'clock the committee of the whole on the deficiency appropriations which was reported to the House with an amendment by Holman, of Indiana, forbidding the board of public works incurring further liabilities to the U. S. for the improvement of streets, avenues, &c., beyond the appropriations previously made by Congress, or from entering into any such contract touching such improvements on the part of the U. S., except in pursuance of appropriations made by Congress. The amendment was adopted and the bill passed; yeas 109, nays 41.

The House took up the bill reported last Tuesday by Banks from the committee on foreign affairs in regard to the National Exposition of Vienna. The bill appropriates a hundred thousand and requests the Governors of the several States to invite their people to assist in a proper representation of American industry.

The amendment offered by Hoar last Tuesday for the appointment of a commission of not more than 12 skilled citizens to attend the Exposition, and report their observations to the President, was agreed to. The bill then passed.

The Senate bill extending the time to present models for the Farragut statue, passed.

The Speaker appointed as a select committee on the loss of revenue stamps in the assistant treasurer's office at New York, Morrison, Cotton, and Cox.

Leave of absence was granted to a great many members.

Amidst much confusion and pressure for adjournment several bills were introduced and referred.

### EUROPEAN.

LONDON, 19.—An important action was taken yesterday, which settles the long dispute with the operators in the cotton mills of Blackburn. At a meeting of masters and card room hands a compromise was effected whereby three-quarters of the advance in wages asked was conceded.

Five men employed in Beckton gas works have been convicted of threatening the manager with violence and sentenced each to a year's imprisonment with hard labor.

CAIRO, 19.—The Khedive has concluded a loan of twelve and a half millions with the Bank of Constantinople.

PARIS, 19.—The Mayor of Nantes has been dismissed for not giving sufficient protection to the pilgrims of Lourdes.

M. Roen, a distinguished member of the Institute, has been struck from the jury list, because he acknowledged that he did not believe in the existence of a God.

The *Journal Des Debats* says the French government has no intention of sending men of war to Hayti to support the demands of the French citizens.

In the Assembly to-day M. Bonnet's motion against duties on raw materials was rejected by a vote of 461 to 158.

Urgency was granted for a proposal to appropriate 200,000 francs for the relief of the sufferers by inundations in France.
