Grasshopper Killer.-A. W. Winberg, Esq., of this city, is the inventor of a machine with the above morning. significant title, the model of which was exhibited by Mr. C. C. A-Christiansen, of Ephraim, in our sanctum yesterday. It is to be constructed and tested in that settlement at as early a day as possible. It is made on the principle of the hay rake and harvester, though the distance between the wheels is considerably greater than in those machines. To each of the two shafts, which are 12 feet apart, will be hitched a horse, and just back of them, in the centre of the machine, works the reel, moved by the motion of the wheels. Immediately behind this, is the axle tree, half covered from behind by a bent sheet iron plate, immediately below which are two massive wooden rollers working inwardly and furnished with scrapers. The theory of action is this: The machine will be driven over the ground infested by the hoppers, which, frightened by the horses, will rise and be swept by the wings of the reel, back against the sheet iron plate, from which they will fall down between the rollers and be crushed. The scrapers, it is needless to add, are for the purpose of keeping the rollers clean and unclogged. It is quite an ingenious arrangement, and we sincerely hope its working will be as effective as its plan is plausible.
