

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

THEATRICAL.—Mr. and Mrs. Waldron have been re-engaged for two nights more, previous to their departure for Montana, and will appear to-morrow night in the romantic drama of the "Corsican Brothers." This drama never fails to give satisfaction when well played, as it will be to-morrow night, and the dual scene invariably brings the house. Mr. Waldron will present, we have no question, a fine impersonation of the twin brothers; and to the play as performed here before, is added an act never yet played here, which embraces some fine points and closes with a gorgeous tableau. As this will be the last appearance but one of this favorite actor and rising tragedian, we bespeak a good house.

STAGE LINE NEWS.—"Wells, Fargo & Co. received at Cheyenne one hundred and fifty horses on Saturday, which are to be sent west for the purpose of opening a tri-daily line between the terminus of the two railroads, now rushing from east and west to meet in the great valley of Salt Lake."

RAILWAY ITEMS.—The Cheyenne Argus has the following: "It is stated the U. P. R. R. have resolved to reduce the passenger rates between this city and Omaha. Instead of \$51.50 a ticket, as heretofore, it will in the course of a few days be put down to \$30. Caution is necessary in crossing the railroad. What might have been a serious accident occurred yesterday morning. A wagon, with a span of mules, got on to the rails just as a freight train came rushing along. The wagon was caught by the locomotive, and it, together with the mules, was dragged along for fifty yards. The wagon was smashed to pieces, but the mules were uninjured. The driver escaped by jumping out."

BANKRUPTCY.—We learn from Register Robertson, firm of Strickland & Robertson, of this city, that the provisions of the insolvent act by which a debtor can become bankrupt if his debts amount to three hundred dollars, whether he have any assets or not, extend only to the first of June. After that date, debtors must have assets to the amount of fifty percent of their debts, before they can take advantage of the bankrupt act.

PROFESSIONAL.—Mr. D. E. Kimball, the gymnast, leaves to-morrow for Cheyenne via the Sweetwater mines.

LAST NIGHT the playing was very good, in "Retribution," at the Theatre. The drama is a thrilling one, and keeps up the excitement and interest till the close. Mr. Waldron played exceedingly well as Friuli, although suffering from a severe attack of neuritis; indeed he is a rapidly rising actor. He was capably supported. The farce made considerable mirth, and the characters, with Mr. Margret's in the principal role, worked hard to make it a success.

WATCH THEM.—General Rockwood requests us to invite superintendents of districts in grasshopper trapping to keep a stricter watch over the traps in the various streams. As the insects keep hatching out in great numbers, we hope the exertions to destroy them will not be relaxed.

SWEETWATER.—We have been favored with a couple of letters from this "suffering" region, written by most reliable gentlemen to persons in this city. From the first, dated the 5th inst., we extract as follows: "The weather here is cold, snowy and winter-like. People—say 1,500 of them—are thrown together here promiscuously. They board around and sleep in tents, cabins, shacks and holes in the ground. The men are ragged, dirty, and many have a lazy look. The quarters are a hell, so far. However, new and better placer mines may probably be discovered. There will not be so large an emigration here this summer as was believed three months ago."

From the next, which was written earlier, we learn that "everybody has got feet to sell." "The town lads were all taken up," the writer says, "before I came here. Some men have as high as eight or ten lots, and when one of their friends come in, they give him a lot; but no Mormon gets them." In another place he says: "I think I can buy provisions here as cheap as you can at home. Bacon is selling at 50c; flour at 10c; dry goods are getting cheap; trains are arriving every day from Cheyenne with provisions and all kinds of goods."
