later. The mother left the child at the door with its play, instructing her little girl to be mindful of it, while she went to the yard for a few minutes. Upon returning the mother missed the little fellow and an inquiry revealed the fact that no one knew just where the child had strayed. A search was instituted in which the neighbors and others who were working nearby joined in. At first it was thought that the little tot had gone into the lucern which surrounds

The stream was then thought of and was followed up and down without any discovery. The father came from work at 3:30 and joined in the search. He im-mediately went to the ditch with his garden rake, but his little sister-in-law who is a member of the family, heard of his intention jumped into the water and preceded him down the stream. She had gone about a hundred yards when she discovered the lifeless body lodged in a willow bush. She gave the alarm which almost broke the heart of the anxious mother. The body was hur-ried to the house and the doctor sum-moned, but was too late to render ald ible proposition.

moned, but was too late to render ald The family have many friends here, being old residents, and have the com-munity's sympathy in their hour of

bereavement. The funeral will be held Sunday from the Sandy ward meetinghouse, com-mencing at 12:20, and interment will be in the family lot in the Sandy ceme-tery.

The city fathers have decided that the city is to be thoroughly renovated and that a garbage man be engaged at the rate of \$4 per day to keep it in this condition. The board of health was in-structed to purchase a wagon and ev-erything necessary in this department. Mr. Godfrey reported that it would cost in the neighborhood of \$100 to fur-nish the power required in sprinkling south State street. The report was ordered referred to the city engineer as to whether or not it would be a feas-ible proposition.
