CONDITION OF JEWS IN RUSSIAN EMPIRE.

M. Davitt Sees Further Catastrophe Ahead Because of Unnatural Economic and Social Conditions.

BELIEVES REMEDY IS ZIONISM.

Russia's Internal Development and Not Her Far Eastern Policy Should Interest America and Europe.

New York, Oct. 9.-Fresh from a visit to the great centers of Jewish population in Pussia, Michael Davitt has written his estimate of the conditions and future of those people in a volume entitled "Within the Pale," which will be issued tomorrow from the press of A. S. Barnes & Company, "The Jew, as he is ruled and oppressed by Russian officials, is a far greater danger to Russian autocracy than anti-Semitism is to the Israelites of the pale," de clares Mr. Davitt in the preface to his work. "The danger," he continues, "was candidly avowed to all the representative Russians from whom I solleited light and information.'

Mr. Davitt sees further catastrophe head because of unnatural economic and social conditions. "The facts of the economic and social conditions within the pale of settlement," he writes, "are so objective that the warning they give of a coming catastrophe cannot be ignored. It would be like

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THE RECENT TRANSFER OF MAJOR GENERALS CHAFFEE AND CORBIN.

The recent assignment of Adjutant General Corbin to the command of the department of the east, with headquarters at Governors Island, New York harbor, and the transfer of Major General Chaffee from the department of the east to Washington as assistant to Chief of Staff Young, whom he will succeed next January, have caused much comment in military circles. In some quarters it is alleged that General Corbin has lost the favor of the administration and will not succeed General Chaffee as chief of staff upon the latter's retirement in 1906. On the other hand, it is asserted that the change is made at the request of General Corbin, who found that under the new army regulations the office of adjutant general was a sort of "fifth wheel" adjunct.
