WASHINGTON, 18.—At half past

road. A card is published to-day,

signed by J. M. Forbes and J. R.

Gravel, calling on the bond-holders

of the Chicago and Burlington

road to oust Jay, Demmon and

Burnham from the directorship of

the C. B. & Q., as they, with fraud-

ulent intent, have caused the

bad management of the Dubu-

que road and its construction com-

panies, and have applied \$240,000

of the money of the C. B. & Q.

for the payment of coupon on

the Dubuque road, thereby mix-

ing the funds of two distinct cor-

porations, and thereby causing

the Burlington and Quincy road

to be decimated by the representa-

tives of certain officials, and al-

lowing the Burlington road to be-

come involved with the Dubu
