

The communication was filed and the action approved.

HYDRANTS AND VALVES.

The committee on waterworks submitted a contract entered into with the Michigan Brass & Iron Works for hydrants, valves, etc. Adopted and referred to the Mayor.

Two members of the committee on police reported adversely upon the appointment of Frederick W. Benson as a police officer on the ground that his eyesight was defective. Adopted.

PUBLIC GROUNDS.

Rich offered the following:

Resolved, That Liberty Park and Pioneer Square and such other public grounds as are dedicated and set apart for park purposes are hereby placed under the control of the committee on public grounds to see that the same are not neglected until such time as the Council will comply with the ordinance requesting the appointment of park commissioners. Adopted.

IMMEDIATE ACTION.

Kelly offered a resolution empowering the city recorder to issue retail liquor licenses immediately after the same are granted by the Council.

This resolution precipitated a tempestuous debate of twenty minutes' duration after which it was referred to the committee on licenses.

LIQUOR LICENSES.

The committee on license reported favorably upon the applications of the following persons for licenses to sell intoxicating liquors: Ed. Norton, M. Fitzgerald, G. C. Charlton, Philip Margel, Godbe-Pitts Drug company, A. Fisher Brewing company, W. A. Gusler, L. W. Dittman and M. E. Mulvey. Adopted.

LIBERTY PARK IMPROVEMENTS.

Moran introduced a resolution providing for an appropriation of \$20,000 for the improvement of Liberty Park, to be expended during the present year under the supervision of the board of park commissioners, or such supervision as the Council may select. Referred to committee on public grounds.

The City Council held an adjourned session last night. At 8 o'clock President Loofbourov had not put in an appearance and Councilman Hardy was called to the chair. The members present were Heiss, Wantland, Beardsley, Almondi, Evans, Kelly, Lawson, Bell, Karriek, Folland, Moran, Horn.

Before the recorder finished reading the minutes, Loofbourov entered and Hardy vacated the chair in his favor.

The Proceedings.

Henry A. Rebertish asked that Redwood road be graded and graveled, beginning at Ninth North street and running south, crossing North Temple and streets south thereof. Committee on streets.

Ohlad & Knight asked that they be allowed to connect their premises with the city sewer system. Committee on sewerage.

ANOTHER FIREPROOFING SCHEME.

Monheim, Bird & Proudfoot, architects, sent in a communication of which the following is a copy:

Gentlemen—At the request of several members of your honorable body for a statement to the council as to the method of construction employed in the third

floor on the joint city and county building, we beg to say that the south end of the county part has steel beam floor and ceiling construction, being arranged for the offices of the district court. The city part of this floor has wood floor and ceiling construction except in the vaults. The city offices on this floor are the city engineer's, board of public works and city attorney's and a large room designed for a city library or court room. We suggest that substituting steel for the wood floor and ceiling construction, in the third and fourth floors and tower, will materially lessen the danger from fire and will add greatly to the strength of the building.

The reading of the communication caused a lively thirty minutes' debate. Several of the anti-fire-proofing members wanted to know how the communication came before the Council and were informed that "someone wanted it." This did not seem to satisfy the querists who said there seemed to be a desperate determination to spend a few surplus thousands for unnecessary work. Motions were made as to its disposition time and again. Finally it was received and filed.

PRIVATE FLAGGING SIDEWALK.

The Salt Lake Dramatic association asked permission to lay their own flagging sidewalks. Board of public works.

WARM SPRINGS LEASE.

Messrs. Barnes and Byrnes lessees of the Warm Springs property sent in a communication in which they represented that they had made permanent improvements greatly in excess of the value of those agreed upon in their lease. The value of such improvements is placed at \$20,000. That for the purpose of competing with other places of like kind, which are being built, greatly improved and repaired, it was necessary to make further improvements on said property to the amount of at least \$10,000. On this showing they asked for an extension of their lease and submitted a form of contract to be entered into with the city.

On motion of Wantland the communication was referred to the committee on public grounds with instructions to ascertain what a relinquishment of the present lease could be secured for in case the city should decide to establish public baths at the Warm Springs.

FORT DOUGLAS SEWAGE.

William Cheshire and others asked that the sewage of Fort Douglas be emptied into the city sewers. Committee on sewerage.

OLD WOOLEN MILLS.

W. H. Chase asked to lease the old woolen mills property at the mouth of City Creek canyon. Committee on public grounds.

MEDICAL EXPERT'S BILL.

Dr. G. W. Foster sent in a bill as medical expert as follows: For visiting garbage depository at Bingham, \$25; two days' attendance at court, \$50.

Committee on claims.

TO MAKE BLUE PRINTS.

The city engineer reported that in order to produce blue prints as the council and departments require, he needed a large sized printing apparatus, so that such work could be done at a reasonable cost, which is not now pos-

sible. Filed and the purchase authorized.

OUTLET OF GRAVITY SEWERS.

The city engineer reported that according to the instructions of the council to himself and board of public works requesting the preparation of plans and specifications for building the gravity outlet sewer, that the matter had proceeded as far as possible before some definite plan of construction and class of material shall be determined upon. He therefore asked that the matter of material and method of construction be either left to the board and engineer or that the council select from the plans shown on accompanying blue print maps, the particular form and material which should meet with approval.

Referred to the regular and special sewer committees associated.

ANNUAL REPORTS.

The city recorder called attention to the importance of having the annual reports for 1892 printed at once. The matter, together with the bids submitted some time ago, was referred to the committee on enrollment.

CATCH BASINS WANTED.

The city engineer sent in the following:

Gentlemen:—As the work of paving West Temple street, between South Temple and Fourth South street, is now about to belet, I beg leave to call attention to the necessity for catch basins and conduits or some equivalent means for conducting the storm and irrigating waters across the intersecting streets, and recommend that such action be taken as will dispose of this work before that of paving shall have been commenced.

Board of public works.

COST OF THE BOULEVARD.

The city engineer reported upon the approximate cost of the boulevard over the route as proposed by himself at the last meeting, as follows:

Between Warm Springs and west bluff of City Creek canyon.....	\$ 5,500
Along west side and back along east side of canon.....	7,000
From east bluff of canyon to northeast corner of city cemetery.....	12,000
From northeast corner of cemetery to relief tank, Parley's canyon water supply system.....	6,500
From relief tank to intersection of Eleventh East and Eighth South streets....	2,700
From intersection of Eleventh East and Eighth South streets to Warm Springs.	7,500
Total.....	\$41,200

The above includes the cost of necessary drains and of engineering, but not of means to sprinkle. Committee on streets.

NECESSARY CROSSWALKS.

Street Supervisor Hines recommended that cross-walks be constructed on Second South and Second West streets, running north and south in front of the county court house; also on First South and Fifth West streets, where there are three car tracks on the street. Committee on streets with power to act.

TO PROTECT THE MORALS OF THE YOUNG.

The city attorney submitted an ordinance prohibiting boys under 21 years of age to visit saloons or play pool or billiards therein. Committee on police.

LOOFBOUROW LEAVES THE CHAIR.

At this juncture of the council proceedings a messenger entered the
